This year has been filled with rich and diverse experiential learning opportunities, enhancing the foundational classroom experience for our students.

Above is a glimpse of some highlights where students explored, expanded their knowledge, honed social skills and discovered more about themselves through varied learning environments.

Science Week

In 2024, Siena College celebrated National Science Week with the theme, *Species Survival: More Than Sustainability.* The week featured an array of exciting activities. Staff embraced their creativity in a themed baking competition, producing delicious and inventive treats. Students engaged in hands-on laboratory sessions, including balloon rockets, spaghetti bridges and an endangered species-themed escape room. A standout event was our inaugural Sustainability Trail, where local primary school students participated in an augmented reality (AR) scavenger hunt around campus, learning about endangered species and creating conservation-themed badges.

STEAM Careers Breakfast

At the annual STEAM Careers Breakfast, we welcomed a diverse group of scientists and engineers, including current parents and inspiring alumnae. This year's keynote speaker, Jessica Pulvirenti (Class of 2014), captivated attendees with her journey into conservation. Working with Zoos Victoria, Jessica has dedicated herself to breeding programs for the endangered Tasmanian Devil. After completing a Bachelor of Science and Honours research on Little Penguins at Phillip Island, Jessica is passionate about preserving Australia's threatened native species. It was inspiring to see one of our very own making a difference beyond our gates!

Year 9 Drama: The Servant of Two Masters

Siena College partnered once again with St Kevin's College to present Carlo Goldoni's *The Servant of Two Masters*. Over two evenings in September, a talented ensemble of Year 9 students transported audiences to the lively streets of 1960s Rome. The performances were filled with humour, chaos and charm, as students showcased their commitment and honed their improvisation and performance skills. Congratulations to all involved, and a special thanks to Mr Goran Banyai and Ms Lucy Waghorn from St Kevin's for their guidance and support in creating this enriching learning experience.

Write a Book in a Term (WABIAT)

As part of the 2024 Book Week celebrations, thirty students from Years 7 to 10 participated in the Write a Book in a Term (WABIAT) program. The process included three key stages:

- Initial Planning
- Creation
- Product Delivery

Students collaborated to produce two books for Italian learners and one for native Mandarin speakers. During Term 3, the creation phase culminated in a full-day writing workshop, with the Year 9 Drama in Education class transforming two books into performances. The final stage was the book presentations, where students watched their stories come to life on stage – a truly rewarding experience for all involved.

Wellbeing in Action

In 2024, the College Theme came to life within the Wellbeing space, inspiring vibrant participation in House events like Fiesta, the Inter House Swim and Dive Carnival, the Inter House Athletics Carnival, and the Wellness Program.

Wellness Week, celebrated in Week 2 of Term 3, offered students a vibrant array of activities designed to promote joy, rejuvenation and wellbeing. The Wellbeing Team curated a rich program that included art and mindfulness sessions, a Buddies Lunch, friendship bracelet making sessions, therapy dog visits, and the ever-popular staff versus student dodgeball games. This initiative provided meaningful opportunities for students to strengthen connections, build friendships, and nurture self-care and growth mindsets.

Child Safety remains a cornerstone of all our work with students. Sophie Pryn (Cassia), Becky Scott (Dianella), Laine Rice (Kurrajong) and Lauren Seymour (Waratah) worked tirelessly to support all students in their respective Houses, creating opportunities for connection through various events and activities. In their daily interactions, they exemplified the Dominican values and led by example. Our continued efforts to promote social and emotional skills, and positive gender norms among students have significantly enhanced overall wellbeing. As updates to the Respectful Relationships resources are released, we look forward to sharing this information with our Siena community.

Respectful Relationships guided the team's collaboration to address some of the key challenges young people face today. These insights were integrated into the Wellness Program and inspired our parent webinar in November, hosted by Headspace. This online session offered practical tips and guidance on how to support young people during challenging times. Headspace provides online and phone counselling services, delivering vital information and assistance to help adolescents navigate transitions and tough periods. We hope participants found the webinar insightful and beneficial.

Headspace played a key role in Term 4, working with our Year 8 students to emphasise the importance of patience and empathy when supporting friends who may be struggling. Students were encouraged to remind their friends that they are always there to support them and to seek the guidance of a trusted adult when appropriate. These workshops highlighted that checking in with a friend, even in small ways, can make a big difference.

Farewell, Class of 2024

Term 4 is always a busy and memorable time, highlighted by our heartfelt farewell to the Class of 2024. Guided by the leadership of Amy Duffy and Melania Flunt, this courageous, joyful and hardworking cohort embodied enthusiasm, inspiration and exemplary leadership. We extend our deepest gratitude to them and wish them every success as they embark on the next exciting chapter of their lives.

Our partnership with Friday Night School (FNS) continues to be a key element of service at Siena College. Walking in the Footsteps of St Catherine

The 2024 Siena in Siena pilot trip in November was an incredible journey for twenty Year 9 students and accompanying staff.

Beginning in Rome, they explored iconic landmarks such as the Trevi Fountain, Vatican Museum, Sistine Chapel, Colosseum and Roman Forum. A highlight was meeting Australian Ambassador to the Holy See, Ms Chiara Porro and visiting Santa Sabina.

Next, they travelled to the picturesque Chianti village where the local community gave them a warm welcome. Students visited the Tavarnelle Museum, a nearby monastery and enjoyed authentic Italian pizza in Barberino. In Siena, they walked in the footsteps of St Catherine, connecting with the city's rich history and learning about the origins of our Rust coloured blazers.

A memorable experience was a cooking class at a Michelin star restaurant in Tavarnelle. Students prepared tortellini, ravioli and cannelloni, and enjoyed the fruits of their labour. They also collaborated with local students, exploring Tavarnelle's history, playing sports and painting terracotta pots for the monastery cloisters as part of a community project.

The group also visited Florence, Pisa, Assisi and Sambuca, with highlights including Florence's Duomo, the Basilica of St Francis in Assisi and the breathtaking views from Rocca Maggiore. In Assisi, they learned about St Francis' humility and love of nature, inspiring reflections on his legacy.

The trip concluded with a final Mass and the completion of the terracotta pot project, symbolising the enduring connection between Siena College and Tavarnelle. This extraordinary cultural, historical and spiritual journey will remain a cherished memory for the students, broadening their horizons and deepening their understanding of Siena's heritage.

Spotlight on Siena Staff is an ongoing series capturing reflections, motivations and advice from some of our amazing Siena College staff - a testament to their unwavering dedication and unique contributions that shape and enrich our community.



Kathryn Anderson Art and Product Design Teacher Three years at Siena College

How did you get involved in working as an educator? How did it all begin?

"Growing up, my country school offered only one VCE arts subject, so I completed three by studying at another school. After graduation, I knew I wanted a career in the arts in Melbourne. Before earning my Bachelor of Teaching (Secondary) and Arts degree at Deakin University, I completed a Diploma of the Arts (Small Companies and Community Theatre) at Swinburne University of Technology. This opened doors to diverse arts opportunities including festivals, touring shows, venue management and team leadership. After starting a family, I transitioned into education, completing a Certificate IV in Training and Assessment, and contributing to the establishment of a traineeship program at Arts Centre Melbourne."

What advice would you give to current students?

"I share the advice I received in secondary school: 'If you do not have a clear vision for your life, do not worry. Do not be afraid to try new things and pursue what you enjoy, building skills and knowledge through experiences that inspire you. This can help you discover a career you love - or even two, as I did!"

How did you get involved in working as an educator? How did it all begin?

"I have always been passionate about music and the idea of passing on that love to others excited me. So, I began teaching the flute when I was nineteen. Initially, I only taught students privately, but soon I branched out and taught in various schools. I loved being back in the fast paced school environment where every day felt different because every student is unique! However, what really solidified my desire to become an educator was a period of volunteer teaching in Cambodia. I adored this experience as I developed both personally and professionally. When I returned home, I commenced my studies in education."

What motivates you in your line of work?

"I was fortunate enough to complete my secondary education at a single sex school where I had a wonderful experience. Having since taught in both coeducational and all girls schools, I am very passionate about providing a safe, encouraging space for young women to uncover their own passions, and to grow and learn about themselves during such a crucial time of development."

Where did you study and have

you completed any further study since your Bachelors degree?

"I hold a Bachelor of Arts (Applied Linguistics) from the Australian National University, a Master of Arts (Children's Literature) from Macquarie University and a Master of Teaching from the University of New South Wales. When Wendy left Siena, she carried with her an inner confidence rooted in true friendships, individuality and community values. This led her to launch WT Domestic Cleaning, which achieved success when she turned twenty.

After selling the business to fund travels across East Africa, India and Southeast Asia, Wendy resumed cleaning operations to support her university studies. Her Siena education laid the foundation for academic success, leading to a PhD and nearly a decade in higher education, teaching and developing programs. In the 1990s, Wendy faced gender bias in her professional roles, often mistaken for a secretary despite her academic leadership.

After achieving her goals in academia, she joined the Victorian Public Sector in 2000, where Siena's social justice values aligned with her work. By 2003, she became an Executive in the Department of Education, navigating challenges, including unsolicited and often contradictory advice to "speak up more" or "talk less". Wendy worked with five Ministers over twenty years, embracing the challenge of "speaking truth to power", with a confidence rooted in her authenticity, nurtured at Siena and strengthened by experience.

Wendy encourages Siena students to step forward with confidence, trust their inner voice, and live authentically as they embark on their next chapter.




We Remember

Sr Frances Caine OP OAM (Class of 1944), the oldest living Siena alumna passed away on 1 August 2024.

Sr Frances joined Siena College in its second year, transferring from St Dominic's Primary School to begin Year 8. At the time, the College had only thirty-two students, and Sr Frances quickly became known for her love of learning and her unwavering commitment to school, rarely missing a day. After graduating from Siena College, Sr Frances entered the Dominican Order in Maitland, New South Wales.

From 1948 to 1989, she dedicated her life to teaching hearing impaired children. In retirement, she extended her service by living with Aboriginal communities on Bathurst Island in the Northern Territory and assisting with Ear Health and Education Programs.

In 2002, Sr Frances was awarded the Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for her service to children with impaired hearing, particularly through the Aboriginal Hearing Health Program in the Northern Territory.

Sr Frances has been a vital link between past students and the College, and her shared memories have been invaluable. A friend to many staff, and a remarkable woman. Sr Frances will be missed.
