### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

#### A Positive and Successful Year

I recently had the pleasure of sitting down with Mrs Hanney to discuss her reflections on the year. Mrs Hanney reflected on the year that has been underpinned by our Dominican context, where we are "grounded in our history, and in the people and community we live and learn with each day". 2023, for the Siena community, has called on us to "pay attention to truth and be astonished by so much gift and opportunity, inspired by our annual theme".

We discussed the year as one that involved many "great community highlights", that demonstrated the College community's ability to flourish. One of these events included Fiesta, which saw a new format and was a "significant shift" for the student community. This new structure showed a "fantastic coming together" of students, in which student leadership was exceptional, in particular the leadership of 2023 College Captains, Majella Hine and Hannah Rosel, as well as House Captains, Veritas, Communications, Arts and Sports Leaders.

### Celebrating as a Community

Further initiatives that Mrs Hanney saw to be significant in 2023 included further implementation of FIRE Carriers work, which included having other schools on site for a formal gathering, coinciding with the launch of our Reconciliation Action Plan, and the 2023 Giving Day – a "fantastic day" which saw the College "reaching out to all of our community members for support". She also expressed the "overall winner" as being the introduction of our Therapy Dogs, Coco and Rooey, who are now well known members of the Siena community. Mrs Hanney framed these events and initiatives as fantastic opportunities to "celebrate as a community, come together in unity, and to give everyone a sense of belonging and safety".

Further, she spoke to the success of the VRQA school review, which the College came through with "flying colours", a testament to the diligent and inspiring work of the Siena community. What came through from this review is that Siena is "very strong in our pillars", in terms of our Dominican charism, which provides a basis for all our actions and endeavours.



#### Individual and Collective Success

Students this past year have excelled in the areas of public speaking, sport and community engagement. They also pursued excellence in academic endeavour with many students excelling in extension opportunities, in personal pursuit of learning success and in close collaboration with great staff. Staff have also seen significant achievement, as exemplified by VCE Drama Teacher, Ms Sandra Siapantas, who was inducted into the Hall of Fame by Drama Australia, recognising her incredibly extensive and committed service to performing arts.

A key point raised by Mrs Hanney is that "in a community like ours we rely on one another, with students and staff being at the core of everything that we do". The success of 2023, as manifested by staff and students, is due also to those who are "cheering from the sidelines", as described by Mrs Hanney. She wishes to acknowledge and thank everyone for a fantastic year – all in the Siena community who have worked to allow the College to thrive throughout 2023. More specifically, she thanked all the volunteers, community stakeholders, members of the Board, members of committees, the Alumnae Association and the Siena Parents' Association.

Mrs Hanney affirmed that it is through the Siena College community's ability to pay attention to every moment, cherish the moments that left us astonished, and embrace and share our experiences in 2023, that we have seen a year of growth, inclusivity, action and excellence.

### **DOMINICAN NEWS**

Siena alumna, Sr Veronica Rosier OP (Class of 1970), visited Cambodia as a volunteer leader of Catholic Mission's Immersion programs.

With a rich history of both highs and lows, the Cambodians are still recovering from the brutal Pol Pot regime. Immersion participants aim to discover how they can contribute to bringing about positive changes in the lives of others and in the world. Sometimes, all we need to do is head out, meet people where they are, listen, be ready to learn, and witness for ourselves the vitality of the global missionary church.

Dominican Sisters from the Solomon Islands, Marie and Salome, completed the Accompaniment Program for Formators in July through the Institute of Formation and Religious Studies in the Philippines. The Sisters spent three months studying online from Australia and then travelled to the Philippines to complete the final five weeks in person at the Institute in Manila. They will take up the shared role of Formation Directors for the young women who will enter the Novitiate in Honiara to commence the Formation Program.

As we approach the end of the 2023 year, College Captain, Hannah Rosel interviewed the Deputy Principal Mission and Identity to reflect on the events of the school year.



Hannah: Our 2023 College Theme is Pay Attention. Be Astonished, Tell About It. How has this been lived out by the Siena staff and students this year?



Ms Levett: As Dominicans, we always need to see the 'big' picture - in this case, the global picture of our Catholic Christian tradition. Fr Timothy Radcliffe OP says "it is

imperative we do this in order to keep our charism recognisable. credible and meaningful for our people." In 2023, who are 'our people'? Our Siena students, families, staff and community. Across this year, our people have lived the theme authentically in many ways:

- Paying attention to our world: its climate, vegetation, people and creatures. Classroom learning has been enhanced and extended by social justice initiatives including supporting our Dominican Sisters locally and in the Solomon Islands, the Kopanang Community in South Africa, Vinnies and Caritas Australia.
- Being astonished by the signs and symbols around us: beauty, goodness, love and hope. Wellness sessions have highlighted our ability to be both grateful and outward looking, with cocurricular offerings drawing us into moments of achievement and celebration. Our College's natural surroundings have continued to provide us with spaces for reflection and conversation.
- Telling about it: we make meaning through story, so sharing our learnings and growth brings others into our story. Participating in rich dialogue including deep listening, has built understanding and created new opportunities for engagement. The Year 12 Retreat, Dominican Days and Staff Formation Sessions have seen the continuation of our story, in the context of listening to the voices of those on the margins.



Hannah: Each year we celebrate St Catherine's Day and St Dominic's Day. What is the significance of these saints and how do we embrace their legacy at Siena?



Ms Levett: When we acknowledge and model the ways of these significant saints in our everyday learnings and interactions, we are embracing and most importantly,

continuing their legacy. When we mark their respective Feast Days with special Eucharistic celebrations, we gather as a community of faith to voice prayers and participate in rituals that have continued across time and space to where we are now. St Dominic and St Catherine of Siena are very much alive in us today!



Hannah: What is the most rewarding part of your role?



Ms Levett: There are many rewarding aspects of my role - choosing just one is a challenge! On reflection, I find it tremendously rewarding to come to Siena each school day knowing that I will be doing something I love, working side-by-side with colleagues who share a vision with me and encountering students who privilege me with a partnership in their learning, wellbeing and spirituality. Being a leader in faith, and witnessing that faith manifest itself visibly and tangibly in various ways among members of our community, often referred to by



different names, is indeed a precious gift.

The 2023 Religious Education program offered valuable opportunities for Siena students to collectively reflect on their Dominican identity and establish connections within their studies.

In Year 7, students began by acquainting themselves with their peers and contemplating their place within the Siena community. They delved into the rich history of Siena College, gaining insights into the Dominican Tradition that underpins our College ethos. The exploration of prominent historical figures like St Catherine and St Dominic, and their impact on the Catholic faith and identity, enriched their understanding. Some reflections from their studies include:

In Unit 2 of VCE Religion and Society, Year 11 students participated in panel discussions on the religious and ethical perspectives of Judaism and Catholicism.

Panellists shared personal faith journeys, insight into ritual practices like Shabbat/Sabbath and ethical teachings, offering a platform for comparing values and principles across faith traditions.

Year 12 Religion and Life students explored Social Justice, including climate justice, through their studies. They engaged with the film *The Letter: A Message for our Earth*, which delves into Pope Francis's encyclical, *Laudato Si*, emphasising care for the environment.

Throughout the year, the 2023 College Theme: Pay Attention. Be Astonished. Tell About It. has served as a reflective touchstone for discussions and contemplation within Religious Education classrooms. Looking ahead to 2024 and beyond, the focus remains on nurturing student engagement with their faith and the Dominican Tradition.

As the Veritas Team, we have been working diligently to instigate positive changes at Siena College in the realms of environmental activism and social justice. Our team comprises both Social Justice Leaders and Environmental Leaders who collaborate closely to garner community support for various initiatives across the entire Siena community.

We have successfully raised funds and gathered donations for organisations such as Vinnies, in our goal to help the community embody the spirit of giving and compassion, while demonstrating the indispensable role these contributions play in enhancing the lives of others. For instance, our Vinnie's Clothing Cube and Rug Up Day effectively raised awareness about the social inequalities surrounding homelessness. These efforts were coupled with the donation of warm clothing to assist individuals in staying warm despite the harsh Melbourne winter. Moreover, our House-led bake sales each term are dedicated to generating funds for charity, all while fostering a sense of House spirit.

Furthermore, we collaborated to relaunch the Eco Activists student and staff group. This initiative encourages students to be more mindful of their ecological footprint and to effect tangible changes within the Siena community. By creating a new webpage, we have enhanced accessibility to educational resources concerning ongoing ecological issues. In Term 3, the Eco Activists led an Op Swap Shop event, enabling students to donate and purchase preloved clothing items, thereby promoting an eco-friendlier approach to fashion. This initiative has played a crucial role in disseminating awareness about consumerism and its associated adverse effects. Additionally, our group participated in the Little Earthies school-based activism education course, which has guided our initiatives and advancement as a collective, enabling us to maximise our impact and expertise.

Hannah: Project Compassion was a remarkable success this year, becoming my absolute highlight among the SRC initiatives. Not only were our fundraising efforts outstanding,

but the SRC also showcased their creativity through a range of activities they organised. The crowd's favourite undoubtedly was our Siena Blind Auction, where the SRC collaborated to assemble suitcases packed with various items, inviting student bidders to embrace the thrill of the unknown. The auction resonated with laughter and enthusiasm as we raised funds for Caritas.



Ms Mackintosh: "An SRC initiative that readily comes to mind and was one of my favourites this year is the Hot Chocolate and Tim Tam stall. It was introduced and

executed last year as a fundraiser for Caritas Ukraine. In 2023, it was elevated for SRC Week with the inclusion of forty-six packs of Tim Tam biscuits generously provided by the Year 11 House Captains. On a chilly winter morning, who would not enjoy a hot drink? Given the limited supplies, planning and time constraints, the results consistently astound me - we raised \$564 in just thirty minutes of selling. The Kopanang Community emerged as the winner through this event."

A select group of Year 8s also attended a creative writing workshop with Kirsty, inspiring them to adopt diverse techniques and modes of thinking, which provided them with newfound sources of inspiration to craft captivating creative pieces.

Gunai woman and award-winning First Nations activist, Kirli Saunders OAM, visited our Year 10 students as part of the *Blak & Bright* First Nations Literary Festival. A distinguished writer of poetry and children's literature, Kirli shared her life experiences with our Year 10s, who were undertaking the Creating and Crafting Text unit. She also unveiled some of her own literary creations, thereby providing a multi-layered encounter with her creative journey. This interaction with Kirli added a profound layer of understanding to the students' comprehension of Australian First Nations justice.

This year, Year 11s began their exploration of the new study design, leading them to delve into various uncharted areas of study and encounter new texts. They were fortunate to have an incursion with Jason Jewell, who delivered a lecture on *Medea* and Ancient Greek Theatre to help them prepare for their upcoming School Assessed Coursework (SAC).

The Year 12s worked diligently throughout the year and were visited by one of the Chief Assessors, Ross Huggard, during their revision week to help prepare them for the final Year 12 exam. They received invaluable advice which guided their revision.




























### HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION

### **HUMANITIES**

A s part of Horizons Week, Year 8 students were visited by real-life knights on Medieval Day who taught students the arts of jousting calligraphy and brass rubbing. Year 8 Geography students completed a fieldwork expedition to Sorrento, which contextualised their learning relating to landforms and landscapes.

Year 9 Geography students ventured out to numerous local sites in Camberwell to collect field data relating to the interconnections between Australia and the world as evidenced in our restaurant and food culture. ### LANGUAGES

SIENA COLLEGE

Effectively involving students in the study of a foreign language can present challenges, particularly in Australia, where monolingualism is prevalent, with only isolated pockets of diverse cultures and languages. Hence, it is crucial to proactively engage students in second language acquisition and offer opportunities for language application.

This year, students harnessed language learning to create visualisations of cherished words, crafting persuasive speeches advocating language study, and devising storybooks and role plays.

Beyond the classroom, they partook in poetry recitation contests and explored culturally significant sites in Melbourne. Included in the following pages are three highlights exemplifying students' language learning involvement here at Siena.

#### Year 9 and 10 Chinese Cultural Day

The Chinese Cultural Day was dedicated to celebrating Chinese culture through various interactive activities and workshops. Our Chinese students took part in a range of experiences that immersed them in Chinese language, traditions and customs. Students witnessed dance and music performances, saw Chinese paper cutting and calligraphy displays, and participated in quizzes.



### **Year 8 Bonjour France Excursion**

Year 8 French classes were privileged to partake in an enriching experience at the National Gallery of Victoria, where they engaged in 'A Day in France with Alliance Française'. This opportunity allowed our students to immerse themselves in the vibrant world of Pierre Bonnard's France during the La Belle Époque era. Students relished talks from

educators conducted in both French and English, offering them an authentic language experience. Through his artworks, students adeptly outlined and identified Pierre Bonnard's cultural and historical context, thereby gaining profound insight into the life and times of France during that period.













### **Year 9 Italian City Immersion**

Students embarked on a journey through Sydney Road and Lygon Street, during which they identified landmarks influenced by Italian culture and encountered buildings and places with Italian origins. They also explored Italian produce stores to observe traditional products and foods, had the chance to sample these items, and sought evidence of the enduring impact of Italian migrants

on this specific part of Melbourne. This experience provided students with an exposure to genuine Italian language and culture, allowing them to develop a deeper appreciation for Italian culture beyond the boundaries of a classroom. This, in turn, nurtured a sense of cultural empathy and understanding.




We look forward to our students continuing to develop their passion for Mathematics in 2024.

Students participated in science quizzes during House Group; laboratory sessions including building balloon rockets and spaghetti bridges; a hydrogen fuel innovation based Escape Room; and viewings of the SCInema short films.

Siena College alumna, Dr Lorien Parker (Class of 1999) joined us again this year as our Scientist in Residence to share her passion and talent for science. She has been involved across Year 7, 8 and 9 classes, showcasing creative new ways to learn about science. Highlights included performing a range of wonderful chemical reactions, students creating beautiful artworks, and students designing their own species for various ecosystems.

We were fortunate to have a variety of STEAM professionals join us throughout 2023, including Geochemistry Lecturer and AGN Data Scientist, Dr Hayden Dalton from The University of Melbourne, who brought along some amazing rock samples to share with our Year 7 students. The STEAM theme continued for our senior Science students as they were invited to contemplate their futures at our annual STEAM Careers Breakfast. We hosted a diverse range of scientists and engineers who shared their career stories. Our keynote speaker, Human-Centred Roboticist and Monash University Senior Lecturer, Dr Elahe Abdi, discussed her journey in engineering and robotics across multiple continents.



### CAREER DEVELOPMENT

We began the year with Year 12 Careers Catch-up meetings, aimed at connecting with Year 12 students to assess their progress in their career journeys. These sessions involve revisiting their Morrisby Profiles to identify gaps in their research on potential careers. We then guide them towards finding answers and additional information to fill these gaps.

At the end of Term 1, Horizons Week took place, which is always a busy period for the Careers Department. This week presented a range of enriching experiences tailored for students in Years 8, 10 and 11.

Career Practitioner, Maree Hodgson, who joined the Careers Team this year, introduced our Year 8 students to the Siena Careers website. She expertly guided them through a series of career quizzes designed to uncover their personal interests, strengths and values, thereby suggesting potential career pathways. Students can revisit their quiz results at any time, enabling them to make well-informed decisions about subjects and tertiary courses as they progress through their academic journey.

The Morrisby Profile has been a comprehensive tool for subject selection and career planning for our Year 10 students. We held follow-up meetings to assist them in navigating decisions about their VCE. Meanwhile, our Year 11 students immersed themselves in three days of career activities. These included an online career planning course named Next Step Navigator, as well as visits to renowned institutions such as RMIT University, The University of Melbourne and Deakin University. Notably, these university visits have emerged as a highlight, significantly shaping the course choices of many students.

Our highlight this year was the annual Careers Showcase, hosted by the Alumnae Association, which coincided with our inaugural Tertiary Careers Expo. Representatives from TAFE, universities, and various industries joined Siena College for the Expo, providing students with insights into career pathways and post-secondary school options. This dual event was a tremendous success and is set to be a regular feature on the Siena Careers calendar moving forward.

Resume writing, interview skills and financial literacy workshops were also a feature of the Horizons Week. Students were taken through the steps to create a professional resume and a LinkedIn profile with Arrive & Thrive founder, Tyson Day.

Other career events this year include the amazing annual Careers Showcase featuring Siena alumnae who have deftly navigated life beyond Siena College to forge successful careers in a variety of fields.
