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# Message from the Principal

66 Our call as Dominicans, is to preach the Truth of the Gospel and our College theme for this very special year is to 'Preach the Gospel of Mercy.
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2016 is a significant year for our College as we celebrate an 800 year anniversary of the founding of the Dominican Order. Pope Francis' declaration of an Extraordinary Holy Year of Mercy coincided with the 800 year Dominican Jubilee and the establishment of the Order in 1216. Our call as Dominicans, is to preach the Truth of the Gospel. Our College theme for this

special year is to 'Preach the Gospel of Mercy'.

We opened a Siena College 'Jubilee Door of Mercy' as part of our celebration of the Dominican Jubilee and in response to Pope Francis' invitation to '...gaze even more attentively on mercy so that we become a more effective sign of (God's) actions in our lives'.

Members of our community, including Dominican Sisters and Friars, staff and students, processed through the Convent cloister to the Holy Door as part of the opening rite. Our College Chaplain, Fr Dominic Murphy OP, struck the door three times with a wooden staff to open it. The wooden staff reminded us of St Dominic, the itinerant preacher. We have named the door Porta Santa, 'Holy Door' in Italian, to reflect the beautiful Byzantine style Convent building and chapel which was designed by Italian Architect, Hamleto Agabiti, and completed in 1939.









The Holy Door tiles were made and decorated by ceramic artist, Mary-Lou Pittard and installed by tiler, Paul Craigie. The deep blue border of the tiles matches the blue dome of the Chapel and they feature Dominican symbols, the Jubilee shield, and lilies from the College crest that represent our Patron, St Catherine of Siena. The tiles also incorporate a Dominican dog with a flaming torch that was said to have been part of a dream of St Dominic's mother, as well as flowers of a native Australian Correa to symbolise our place in Australia.

As we pass through this door over the year, we are invited to enter a new relationship with God, to reflect on God's boundless love and compassion and on how we are called to follow the example of Jesus to offer love and forgiveness without measure.

In January of this year, Professor Nicholas Tonti-Filippini was posthumously named an Officer in the general division of the Order of Australia (AO), for distinguished service to tertiary education, particularly in the area of bioethics, through academic leadership and advisory roles to medical research. Professor Tonti-Filippini was a past parent and former Chair of the Siena College Board.

Susan Alberti, alumna and benefactor of Siena College, was honoured with the award of a Companion of the Order of Australia (AC) in the 2016 Australia Day honours list, for eminent service to the community as a fund raiser, advocate, mentor and role model. This is the highest commendation given and Susan was one of only three women to receive an AC this year. Susan Alberti has been an intrepid and courageous advocate for women on so many fronts, from leading a company in a male driven construction industry, to taking on a television channel to challenge a denigrating portrayal of women, and promoting opportunities for women in sport, particularly in Football. Susan also supports female scientists by funding research assistants to allow for projects to continue during periods of parental leave.

The property at 6 Compton Street, that was previously leased to accommodate the College Counsellors, was acquired by the College in December last year. It was the home of Maria Mezei and her family and on April 13, her son Andrew and daughter Maggie, attended the Term 2 College assembly to share Maria's story with our community. Their story is one of a post war refugee family from Hungary who left their home after the 1956 uprising and the ensuing response from Stalinist forces. They left all their property and possessions behind to walk through the night with their new baby towards the Austrian border. They heard border guards nearby shooting at other refugees, and were fed by villagers before emigrating to Australia some six months later as refugees.

The Mezei family arrived at the refugee camp in Bonegilla in Northern Victoria, and afterwards found work and accommodation in Melbourne. Maria found a run-down commercial property in Hawthorn. Her husband, Emil, thought it was a dump, but Maria was convinced that it would make a good factory and home. They bought the place, and over the next ten years worked tirelessly to build their business and raise their children Magda and Andrew.

In 1971, Emil became sick, and passed away. Maria was distraught, but managed to reorganise her life; she learned to drive, sold the factory, and bought 6 Compton St, Canterbury. Maria's touching story, now a biography, will be housed at 6 Compton Street along with photographs of the past to preserve the history of the property for generations to come. We have inherited Maria's lovely garden and the inspiration of her courage and determination. The house will be named Mezei House in her memory.

# Our Dominican History

#### An 800 year tradition

Porn in Caleruega, Spain, St Dominic de Guzman (1170-1221) founded a religious order to preach the Word of God. The Order of Preachers was approved in 1216 and so began a religious tradition that has spread across the world.

St Dominic believed in the power of education to develop well informed, articulate people whose lives, through prayer, community and service, would best reflect the life of Christ to the world.

Dominican theologians, philosophers and preachers such as St Albertus Magnus, St Thomas Aquinas, Fransisco de Vitorio and Antonio de Montesinos, inspired critical thinking of the law, the role and actions of world leaders and of the Church.

Our patron, St Catherine of Siena (1347-1380), a lay Dominican whose intense spirituality inspired others around her, had considerable influence on religious thinking and on the political leaders of the day, most famously when she encouraged Pope Gregory XI to return from Avignon to Rome and take up his duties more directly.

Branches of the order spread rapidly throughout Europe with a foundation in Dublin, Ireland being established in 1224.

On 10 September 1867, eight Sisters from Dun Laoghaire, Ireland, arrived in Australia to settle and establish a convent at Maitland. Thus began a new chapter in the Dominican story. From Maitland, other convents were established in New South Wales.



#### 90 years in Camberwell

In 1926, at the request of Archbishop Mannix, four Dominican Sisters from West Maitland came to Camberwell. On 12 August, MM Concepta O'Donoghue, SM Loreto Cockerill, SM Perpetua Hermann and SM Placid Flaherty were met at Spencer Street (Southern Cross) station by the Dominican Vicar-Provincial, Father Jordan Powell, the Prior of St Dominic's, Father Hogan, Father Rupert Roche OP, Mrs Annie Rudd, a former Maitland pupil, and her daughter and cousin.

A month later on 12 September, the tiny two bedroom cottage in Riversdale Road, in Camberwell, was officially opened and blessed by Archbishop Mannix.

The Sisters supported the work of the friars at St Dominic's, but soon came to realise that there was a need for a secondary school. Over the next ten years, the Sisters began the planning and development of a much larger convent that would act as both convent and school for many years.

Only in 1961, was a purpose built school building developed and opened. Since then, the College has expanded in both size and population.

While there have been many changes to the buildings, population size and curriculum, it is the Dominican tradition that underpins our Siena community and remains a constant and living presence.

May it do so for another 800 years and beyond!

#### We profile our Deputy Principal Learning and Teaching, Bernadette Donnelly



The Siena College community is delighted to welcome our new Deputy Principal Learning and Teaching, Bernadette Donnelly. Bernadette brings to Siena College a wealth of experience and a passion for education and working with young people to help influence them to make the most of their individual gifts. She has been married to her husband Ric, for thirty years and has two children. Her daughter

Rebecca is completing her final year studying Medicine and her son, Kieran is a graduate architect.

Bernadette grew up in Warragul as the only daughter and middle child of five children. She completed her schooling at the local Catholic schools in Warragul before going on to finish a Bachelor of Arts at Monash University and Diploma in Education at Christ College, now Australian Catholic University (ACU). She taught at Killester College for two and half years before taking up the opportunity of working in an indigenous community outside Katherine in the Northern Territory for a year. Living and working in the Barunga community for a year, proved to be a truly forming experience for Bernadette, deepening her passion, understanding and concern for indigenous affairs. She is greatly appreciative of the early mentoring of her Principal, Kate Bazjik. Kate was a woman of true principle, who constantly fought for the rights of indigenous students and staff under difficult circumstances. She taught Bernadette a great deal about resilience and to follow through on what you believe in, regardless of the obstacles that vou may face.

On leaving the Barunga community, Bernadette and Ric travelled to Europe for six months and then over to Japan where they taught for six months. They returned home for the birth of their first child, Rebecca. Their love of Japan, the culture, food and people, drove them to return to Japan when Rebecca was five months old. Their experience in Japan played a large role in forming Bernadette's understanding of what is possible if you are prepared to take a risk and not to be fearful of the unknown. It also helped develop a love of travel and the importance of understanding other cultures. Living in a foreign country also allowed them the time and space to establish their own family unit and how they would raise their children.

Bernadette and her family returned home to Warragul for the birth of their second child, Kieran two and a half years later. They stayed in Warragul for fifteen years to raise their family in the country. While there, Bernadette taught at her old high school, Marist Sion College for ten years. She initially taught English, Religious Education and History, but went on to teach Japanese after spending another year in Japan with the whole family, when the children were four and seven years old. She decided to formalise her Japanese teaching qualifications, studying Japanese for a year at Monash University, while teaching and raising the family. Bernadette went on to hold many leadership positions at Marist Sion, encouraged

by her greatest mentor, Joan Pilgrim. Joan had taught her English and French when she was a student at school and later, worked with her as the Deputy Principal at Marist Sion College. Joan taught Bernadette many things and always encouraged her to put forward her new ideas if they were of benefit for the students. The most valuable lessons Joan taught her were that even though 'consistency is very important, it can mean different things for different cases' and that 'there aren't many problems or situations that can't be worked out'.

In 2003, Bernadette moved to St Paul's Anglican Grammar in Warragul and in 2004, was appointed as Head of the Senior School. Working at the same school that her children attended and where her husband taught was a unique, but wonderful experience. In 2008, the family returned to Melbourne and Bernadette took up the position of Director of Curriculum at Loyola College. This position was elevated to Deputy Principal Teaching and Learning and she continued in this role for a further three years. During her time, she completed her Masters of Educational Leadership. With the departure of the Foundation Principal of Loyola, who had been at the school for over twenty-seven years, coinciding with her appointment, Bernadette embraced the opportunity to implement new ideas and review teaching and learning practices. She especially loved implementing ideas that connected and reinforced the Ignatian values of conversation, academic excellence, hospitality and social justice. As a community they were able to reflect, review and implement change that ultimately provided greater opportunities for the students.

# Celebrating International Women's Day



This year, the theme for International Women's Day was 'Pledge for Parity.' All members of the community were invited to think about what parity might look like in the workforce and at home. The annual IWD breakfast was held in the Susan Alberti Auditorium. The table placements all included statistics highlighting how far we still must journey as a society before gender

parity is reached. For example:

- Of the world's poorest billion people, three fifths are girls and women
- Of the one hundred and thirty million children who are out of school, 70% are girls
- Each year, half a million women die and eighteen million more suffer chronic disability from preventable complications of pregnancy and childbirth
- Up to 50% of all adult women have experienced violence at the hands of their intimate partners

A focus on parity needs a collective effort. This year, students were invited to bring a significant woman or man in their life. Male members of the community attended the breakfast in pleasing numbers and were invited to sign the 'He for She' pledge. This UN initiative was spearheaded by Mr Martin Gibbs, Dianella

House Coordinator. The aim is for as many male members of the community as possible to pledge to:

### Commit to taking action against gender discrimination and violence in order to build a more just and equal world.

The highlight of this year's breakfast was our keynote speaker, Dr Stephanie Jackson. Stephanie was the Dux of the Class of 2005. She studied at Monash University and was also the Dux of Medicine Surgery. More recently, Stephanie has been practicing obstetrics and gynaecology at Mercy Hospital and has also just become a mother herself.

Stephanie has lent her incredible skills to a small village hospital in Fiji and also in remote indigenous communities. Her impact was so great that one mother in Fiji even named her baby after Stephanie. Stephanie's vivid descriptions, contrasting the conditions that labouring mothers in Fiji experience compared to Australian mothers, was sobering. Her clear message that the audience took from her speech was to always practice kindness. This message was especially timely considering Stephanie spoke with us during our year of mercy. Stephanie embodies compassion and commitment to the alleviation of distress.

# South African Immersion Trip 2016 Kopanang

The Kopanang ethos begins with the statement 'Our values are like a roadmap, guiding and directing our behaviours to achieve our desired destination.' In keeping with this ethos, the official immersion shirts worn by each student and staff member included the phrase 'Journeying Together.'

In its fourth year, the South African Immersion trip is designed so that each Siena student and staff member who attends Kopanang Community Trust and lives in the township of Tsakane for two weeks, can journey with the women, hear their stories, see things through their eyes and find common traits and bonds. The trip is not designed for the students to feel a weight of guilt for the privileges they have at home. The purpose of the trip is to find common bonds, explore faith, discover strength. Our hardships are so diverse, but what ties us to the women of Tsakane is that we are all sisters and daughters. Many of us are mothers. Irrespective of birthplace and we are all capable of great love and compassion.

Days were spent at Kopanang, tutoring the students who are used to being in classes of seventy, teaching the women how to use computers, working in the crèche and preparing meals. The girls also visited the shack areas of the township to hand out desperately

needed clothes and toiletries, much of which was donated by the Siena community. The students also had the opportunity to visit the Apartheid Museum and the Hector Pieterson Memorial Museum. While confronting, these museums gave valuable insight into the complex history of South Africa.

The Siena students stayed in the homes of the Kopanang women in groups of two. All the students lived the way their host mothers do. No one had hot running water, at times there were rolling blackouts and phones and iPads were non existent. All students, nevertheless, reported feeling completely at ease in their new environments because of the immediate and binding sense that they had become members of a family.

Fundraising efforts for Kopanang will continue at the College throughout the year. The next event to be hosted by the SRC in Term 3 will be *Night of Change* with all money raised going towards a self-defence program for the women of Kopanang.

#### Dear Sponsors

The new-year has arrived carrying a whole lot of dreams and expectations for every single person, including myself. I always prepare a year plan where I jot down my visions and a few dreams I would like to attain, but a few years back I would write down all the big dreams and hopes for the future and once I have completed my year-plan (actually my long term-goals) I would go through everything and realize that the picture I have created in my mind that envisions the future is not attainable without a good education accompanying one's hopes, dreams and ambitions.

I am also pleased to say that 'good education' is not just a dream for me anymore but it has now become a possibility through the huge blessings that you have entrusted me with.

I will be moving to the city (Johannesburg) on the 1st of February 2016 because that is where my studies will take place (at the University of Johannesburg-Auckland Park campus). 
Danielle Gilmartin was awarded the Dean's Outstanding Scholarship at Swinburne University of Technology where she is studying Engineering.

#### Barbara Shea

Barbara Shea was the seventy-seventh student enrolled at Siena College. She came to the College in February 1944 in Year 9 and left in December 1945. While she came back to visit some of the students and Sisters in the late 1940s, she did not return again until 2013, over sixty years later. Since then, Barbara has reconnected with Siena and is happy to share her memories.





Mother Gonsalvo's classroom was next to the Chapel and there were only six students in the French class. There were no desks in the room only a table made from an old door, still with its door handle holes.

When the students got bored they would put a pencil into one of the holes and then lever the door-table slightly on an angle and by magic, everyone's pens would roll to the other side and then roll back! The noise would startle Mother Gonsalvo and the girls would all say that something must be happening outside and rush to the window to check! Anything to make the class go faster! Such naughtiness!!

Barbara also remembers chasing after the rounders ball and sometimes going after it when it was on top of the laundry. She enjoyed herself immensely when pinetree climbing along Wattle Valley Road, all memories from a very happy time at Siena College.

Having left Siena, Barbara looked after her ill mother for some time and then embarked on a kindergarten course, followed by mothercraft nursing. She also began to consider how else she might live out her faith in a meaningful way.

In 1957, she was one of a small group of lay people who decided to make an apostolic commitment in lay life and so established the Mariana Secular Institute. Barbara led the group for many years and helped train people who were going to work with indigenous people in the Kimberley region of Western Australia. She worked at Pallotti College, Millgrove near Warburton for over thirty years and eventually retired to Berwick.

Her connection to Siena College continues. One of her grandnieces, Emma Hancock, was in the Class of 2008 while another joined Siena College in 2015.

Barbara is very proud of her time at the College and when she last visited Siena, remarked that "even though I wasn't a good student, I really, really enjoyed myself! The atmosphere was great!"

Her return to Siena has been equally positive. "I felt then and feel now, a strong connection to Siena. I am part of a wonderful community."

# Where are they now?

### Three generations...

Former student, Ruth Puchlenko (nèe Cecil), visited Siena College recently and shared memories of her time spent at the College and of her aunt, Shirley Lodge (nèe Cecil) who was the third student enrolled at the College in 1940.

As St Dominic's Primary School ran classes up to Year 8, a number of our early students came to Siena College in Year 9. Shirley Cecil was one of them.

Shirley was Head Prefect in both 1940 and 1941. In those days, the Sisters chose the Head Prefect. It was clear that she was very well regarded in her time at Siena. Shirley was taught elocution at Siena and received medals of distinction. She left Siena at the end of Year 10 and took up a secretarial position at radio station 3DB.

Within a very short time, she became a radio announcer and took part in pioneering black and white television programs. These included *For Women Only, The Country Hour, Junior Talent Time* and many others. Shirley quickly became an instantly recognisable face and voice for Melbournians.

In 1945, Shirley met the love of her life, Mike Lodge, on a hike with St Kevin's Old Boys and Siena past students.

During the early years of Siena College, there were only two Houses, the Calerogans and Aquins. Sports Days always had a marching event that had practices run by one of the Sisters and was treated very seriously. For many years, there was only one Sports Day trophy for the overall winner of the day's events. It was this original trophy that was at some stage engraved 'Shirley Lodge (nèe Cecil) Marching Trophy', an indication of the respect and affection in which Shirley was held.

Shirley died in September 2010.

While Shirley didn't have children, she was godmother to her niece, Ruth Cecil, who came to Siena College in 1957.

Ruth was the 437th student enrolled at Sienal She remembers Siena fondly and especially the fun times getting up to typical teenage mischief. Ruth especially remembered the time when a number of her classmates and she, brought a lit cigarette into the classroom and surreptitiously snuck puffs of it before handing it to the next person. As windows were generally open, even in winter, they waved the smoke away saying that Melbourne's fog was to blame!

Ruth left Siena to take up a hairdressing apprenticeship and continued to work and teach hairdressing for many years.

Her daughter, Tarnia Puchlenko, was a student at Siena in the 1980s and was a member of the Class of 1990. She eventually went to university and completed a business and marketing degree. Tarnia worked for many years in the superannuation industry. Tarnia and her partner are now living in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, where her partner is working for the United Nations.

In this year of jubilee, it was lovely to hear about the lives of three generations of the extended Cecil family and to appreciate the strong connections that each had to the Siena College community.
