From the Principal

What have been the big questions in your life? Who am I? With whom will I share my life? What will I do with this precious gift of life? What is my response to the needs of the world? Jesus, in typical straight talking fashion, asks us another big question: Who do you say I am? The 2020 College theme, Who do you say I am is taken from the Gospel of Matthew and forms the basis of our reflections with staff and students this year.

Six words to probe us. An invitation is extended to us, as it was to his disciples, to know and to name Jesus. An aspect that I particularly like about Jesus' question is that of relationship. We are invited into an encounter with the one who knows us and urges us to use our voice. Encounter and relationship are at the heart of our faith, at the heart of our community and at the heart of being educators.

Encounter and relationship marked my commencement as Principal of Siena College, in the most unusual of beginnings! The year began with the devastating backdrop of bushfires and extreme weather conditions of searing heat, smoke haze and ash filled air. Many family, friends and colleagues experienced none of the usual lazy summer days of relaxation; instead they were evacuated, isolated and told to remain inside due to air quality. Talk of climate change action dominated public discourse. Not one month later, we found ourselves caught up in a worldwide health scare as the coronavirus swept across the globe. Unsettling times for our students in particular as events were cancelled

or postponed, social distancing and increased hygiene practices were enforced and ultimately, the College moving to online learning and early school holidays. At the time of writing this article, we continue to hear of the escalation of COVID-19 in Australia and abroad, bringing with it heightened measures of isolation and medical response. At Siena, we are acutely aware not only of health fears but of impacts on employment for members of our community and the continued unknown of when face to face teaching and connecting will resume. These are worrying times for all, perhaps particularly so for our senior students. And yet. Have we not all been touched in some way in this time of separation and slow? Acts of generosity and kindness, acts of creativity and ingenuity; acts of unity and solidarity. When this time passes, what will we bring back to the ordinary, from this time of extraordinary? What lessons learned?

In recent weeks, we have been offered some wonderful reflections by notable writers and preachers. I share with you two comments which have stayed with me. Fr Timothy Radcliffe OP:

Yes, there is isolation, but also a new and wide communion of those who care. Let us hope that we shall discover that just as the virus reaches beyond national boundaries and does not need visas, so we shall renew our sense that we belong to a single human community from which no exit is possible.



And another, from Marianne Williamson:

Something very beautiful happens to people when their world has fallen apart: a humility, a nobility, a higher intelligence emerges at just the point when our knees hit the floor.

In these strange times, I commend the staff of Siena College, along with students and families for the 'very beautiful' examples of humility, nobility and higher intelligence; online learning preparations, supports and encouragements on social media and in communications, connections within and beyond Siena platforms, acts of compassion and generosity – all this despite fear and uncertainty.

And so, my introduction to Siena has been unusual to say the least, but no less blessed.

Please enjoy reading this edition of The Spirit and I look forward to sharing and celebrating the good gifts of Siena College with you.

Our College Captains, Laura Griss and Adrienne Duray, interviewed our new Principal, Elizabeth Hanney.

WHEN AND WHERE DID YOUR CAREER IN EDUCATION BEGIN?

My career in education began at Nazareth College as a twenty-three year old. It was Nazareth's first year of operation so I began as a graduate teacher with a great group of 'pioneer staff' and around eighty Year 7 students. It was a fantastic experience; during my time there I came to realise how much I love teaching and how much we learn from each other regarding teaching, leadership and being in a community. Thanks to the leadership at the time, I was encouraged to grow my own leadership and I will be forever grateful for that. Your first job as a graduate in any field is such an exciting and formative time.

DID YOU HAVE ANY JOBS/STUDY SOMETHING DIFFERENT PRIOR TO YOUR TEACHING CAREER?

After I left school I had a number of part time jobs: in a bakery, in hospitality and in a toy shop! This enabled me to learn some great skills and helped me buy my first car, a rusted out Corolla which I loved!

WHAT DO YOU LIKE MOST ABOUT BEING PRINCIPAL AT SIENA COLLEGE

Siena is a fantastic place. I discovered this on my first visit last year when I met both of you for the first time. I was struck by two things: your warm welcome to me and your tangible, infectious love of Siena. Both of you spoke so affectionately about your community; the commitment of teachers and support staff, the lifelong friendships you have developed, the real the sense of community and connection and finally, about how alive the Dominican spirit of truth seeking is.

I'm so grateful for all who have gone before me; for Mrs Robson Garth, for the Dominican Sisters, for the many students and staff who have brought so much heart, soul and mind to this great place of learning and life. As Principal, I feel so pleased and proud to be here and this has only grown since meeting the young women of Siena.

WHAT ARE YOU MOST LOOKING FORWARD TO THIS YEAR?

I'm enjoying learning about the Siena community. I'm enjoying meeting students and getting to know staff. I am also really enjoying learning more about the Dominican story and seeing it woven through everything - in artwork and symbolism around the College, in the curriculum and, importantly, in how it is lived in decision making, in relationships with others, in justice, service, prayer and community.

WHAT NEW INITIATIVES ARE YOU HOPING TO BRING TO THE SIENA COMMUNITY?

I hope to look at ways we can continue to increase student voice in their learning and in their community - what interests them, what's important to them, how can we best work together to give students everything they need in the here and now, and in readiness for their future. I also hope to work with the great staff at Siena to look at our curriculum, our programs, our camps, trips and all extra curricular opportunities to make sure we are offering Siena girls the very best. We need to be mindful of what the world needs in terms of future employment trends, but also what the world needs in terms of women pioneering and addressing social and environmental needs.

I'm also hoping to bring a great new Master Plan to life, ensuring that our learning environment caters for contemporary learning and sets the scene for excellence for all, now and for the next generation of Siena students.

WHAT DO YOU LIKE TO DO IN YOUR FREE TIME?

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I like reading, going to the theatre and movies, walking, and catching up with family and friends

WHAT HAS BEEN THE BIGGEST HIGHLIGHT OF YOUR CAREER?

As strange as it sounds, I have a big career highlight every year. It's when we celebrate with graduating Year 12 students. This time is a highlight for me because it's the bringing together of such love and expertise on the part of teachers, parents and friends which culminates in this fabulous milestone for young people, finishing school. I have personal career moments but what gives me a real buzz is seeing 'world ready' young women who have been shaped by a great Catholic education, blessed with lifelong friends and all the knowledge, skills and values they need to make the world a better place; hopefully living happy and fulfilled lives.

Local Sister, Margaret Fields OP (Class of 1954) spent time in the Solomon Islands in January over the holiday break teaching an intensive English program to the young Sisters. Lessons in reading, writing, speaking and listening aimed to upskill the Sisters studying to be teachers, nurses and pastoral workers. The Sisters worked hard and appreciated the opportunity to improve their English skills.

Sr Margaret teaches English at Mercy Connect in Dandenong to refugee women each week, as well as English to a number of newly arrived religious in formation belonging to different religious congregations in Melbourne.

Sr Mary-Clare Holland OP, Prioress of the Dominican Sisters of Eastern Australia and the Solomon Islands, visited Papua New Guinea in November as part of a delegation of Australian Church Leaders to see first hand the situation for those seeking asylum or refugee status. Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv led the delegation. With the closure of Manus Island Detention Centre, one hundred and twenty detainees were transferred to Port Moresby in August 2019 and, along with a couple of hundred other asylum seekers

in Papua New Guinea, await resettlement. The men held at Bomana are denied visitors, phones, access to lawyers and have minimal rations each day. Most lose weight and subsequently find themselves in the psychiatric ward at the private hospital, often as a result of self harm and mental illness. They have lost hope as their claims have been rejected or they have chosen not to participate in the refugee determination process.



"Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" And they said, "Some say John the Baptist,


but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets."

Learning and Teaching

Congratulations to the Class of 2019 whose outstanding results again placed Siena College in the Top 8 ranking of Catholic schools and in the top 9% of all Victorian schools. Siena College performed above the state average with a median study score of 33, and 13.7% of all study scores were over 40. Three of our VCE students were also acknowledged in the VCE Seasons of Excellence program, Top Arts and Top Class Drama. Overall, these are impressive statistics and we are very proud of our students' academic achievements. We are also proud of the way the girls worked during the year, participated in their classes, supported each other in their learning and contributed positively to the life of the school. We look forward to continuing our ongoing relationship with the Class of 2019, as they follow their dreams and make valuable contributions to the Siena College community as alumnae.

In 2019 we developed and refined the Siena Pedagogical Model, designed to best help in the transfer of knowledge and skill, and to utilise the most effective and proven learning processes that support students. The focus of 2020 is to continue to foster collaboration through our learning teams as we embed and continue to hone the Siena College Lesson Framework in the classroom. Our commitment is to ensure our teaching is always fresh, dynamic

and relevant and effectively

The Learning Centre continues to seek ways to engage our students in authentic learning opportunities. In 2019, we were able to set up a well-equipped podcasting studio with the expertise of our Audio Visual Technician, Anthony George. This term our very own podcast, SienaCast was launched. SienaCast provides the opportunity for students and staff to collaborate on a common project and to creatively explore different aspects of an agreed theme. Our first episode, themed Women was launched to coincide with the College's celebration of International Women's Day and the second, titled Diversity, has just been released. Students work in teams and host regular segments, in addition to publishing individual pieces of work related to the episode theme. The podcast is an exciting platform for the College community to engage with a range of topics of interest and concern to them.

Finally, the last few weeks of Term 1 have presented us with a new set of unprecedented challenges. Our response to the possibility of remote learning due to COVID-19 has been considered, collaborative and well planned in a very short time frame. The learning and preparation to create an effective online learning environment, one that caters for the different needs of senior and middle school students, has been an extraordinary feat. The blended learning model, including teacher direct



instruction, collaborative opportunities and independent online learning are designed to ensure continuity of quality learning and maintaining connection with our students. I can't thank the Director of Innovation and Learning, our Heads of Learning, all teaching staff, support staff and IT enough for their incredible assistance and time spent in preparing for learning remotely.

As we continue to make adjustments and rise to the challenge of accommodating our changing circumstances. let us all consider it to be an opportunity to enact our Dominican charism and support others through our individual responses to these incredible times.

The highly anticipated Big Sister Little Sister PJ party follows on from the shared lunch and is an event that encourages students to further connect with one another. Through dancing, structured games and sharing dinner, relationships are fostered and connection to the Siena community is strengthened.

International Women's Day Breakfast



Sunday, 8 March, 2020 marked International Women's Day, a global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women. The day also marks a call to action for accelerating women's equality.

Siena College celebrated International Women's Day this year with our annual breakfast on Thursday, 5 March. This community event provided a wonderful opportunity to gather together to acknowledge the achievements of women, and reflect on the status of gender equality. We also joined together in support of the Kopanang Community Trust, of which Siena College is a proud supporter.

The Kopanang Community Trust was established in April 2001, driven by the call to help women desperately in need of community support, due to the ongoing impact of HIV/AIDS. These women were in need of a sustainable income to feed their families, most of whom had very little to live on. The Kopanang women learn embroidery skills, and foster each other's creativity, to produce beautiful pieces which are sold around the world. This allows them to make a living with their skills, and thus support their family.

Women come to Kopanang to share their hopes for a different future, as they are supported through the all too common reality of poverty and ill health. They learn skills that empower them into a new awareness of the power of community, enabling them to share their cultural and spiritual stories and hopes. At Kopanang, they find their voice.

The funds raised from our International Women's Day Breakfast will help

the women of the Kopanang Community via the support of an organisation called Project Dignity. This program provides reusable sanitary pads





for the young women of Kopanang, whilst delivering an educational program. The sanitary products provided are more environmentally friendly than many alternatives, and due to their reusable nature, will reduce financial pressure associated with buying single use products. More importantly, it will help reduce disruptions to school attendance and therefore the educational program for young women due to a lack of access to sanitary products during their periods.

Ella Gurry, one of our current Year 12 leaders, and Maddie Harriss (Class of 2018), spoke at the breakfast about their experiences participating in the Kopanang Immersion, living with members of the Kopanang community, and experiencing daily life in Tsakane, South Africa, and how their learning has been shaped by that experience.

Our guest speaker for the morning was Siena College alumna, Emma Yee (Class of 1999), who shared her story of perseverance and achievement. Emma's

experience spans over twenty years

working in the hospitality industry with some of Australia's biggest brands. In 2017, Emma was appointed the youngest and first ever female Chief Executive of Peter Rowland, a position she held for two years. Emma is an innovative leader with a track record of delivering visionary leadership, and strategic business outcomes. Despite facing many challenges throughout her career, Emma shared with us how her education, work experience and mentors gave her the ability to take on challenges to further her career, achieve goals, and continue to push the boundaries as a female leader.

The International Women's Day breakfast was a valuable opportunity for our current students to be inspired by Emma's journey, and celebrate the achievements of our Siena College alumnae, whilst supporting our sisters at Kopanang.

Student Leadership at Siena College



The Siena College Student Leadership Program was off to a strong start this year, with our 2020 student leaders attending a Student Leadership Forum prior to the commencement of the academic year.

This day provided our leaders with the opportunity to reflect on their understanding and practice of leadership in a Dominican community under the guidance of Sr Sheila Flynn OP. Siena College staff facilitated leadership skills workshops and the students worked in teams to set goals, develop strategies and plan for their year in leadership.

Our Student Leadership Team has had a busy first term, working on a number of projects including planning for the International Women's Day Breakfast, preparing students for the House Swimming and Athletics Carnivals and encouraging participation in a number of events.

The first Siena College Student Forum will take place later this year, providing an opportunity for all students to share their ideas with the Student Leadership Team. Our aim is to promote student voice across all year levels of the College.

A group of students who completed the Pillars Leadership Program last year have formed a team to coordinate Siena College's response to Caritas Australia's annual Project Compassion campaign. They attended a workshop facilitated by Caritas, planning activities to educate their fellow students about the campaign.

These include:

• Recording messages explaining the work of Caritas to be played during Pause and Pray

- Reminder signs on water taps educating the Siena College community about water usage, access and sanitation issues across
- Displaying educational material on screens and notice boards around
- Working with House Group teachers to share Project Compassion stories to students during House Groups

These activities were designed to raise awareness among the community of both global and local justice issues. which will culminate with some fundraising activities throughout 2020, allowing all students to further support the Project Compassion campaign.

The Pillars Leadership Program has continued to grow in 2020, starting with our Year 7 Leadership Program taking place this term. This will continue for our students in other year levels throughout 2020. It has been wonderful to see a large number of Year 7 students who are interested in learning more about leadership, with thirty-eight Year 7s involving themselves in the program. Many have been involved in leadership

in their primary schools, and are committed to continuing learning about leading. They have been reflecting on the way that Dominican values influence leadership, which characteristics make effective leaders. They will soon listen to a presentation from some of our Year 8 and 9 leaders who will share their leadership journeys and answer auestions.

With a busy start to the year, and many more planned events on the horizon, Siena continues to provide our students with ample opportunity to develop their leadership skills.

The following is Julia's acceptance speech:

Thank you to the Siena College Alumnae Association for selecting me from a talented pool of fabulous women. I'm honoured and honestly rather thrilled to receive this STEM award named after the truly inspirational Dr Ursula McKenna. It means a lot to be recognised by the Siena College community, a place in which I received such a solid foundation of learning and where I began developing the confidence that I had something valuable to contribute to the world.

I'm disappointed that I can't be there in person to speak with you all but I'm delighted that one of my own personal scientific inspirations, my mum, Dr Anne Marchingo is here instead on my behalf.

The reason I can't be here is that I currently live in Scotland. This is one of the wonderful aspects of a career in science – it can take you all over the world because when you become a scientist you become part of a larger global community of people who are working together towards a common goal – the pursuit for new knowledge, for greater understanding of human health and for the development of better treatments for disease.

So how did I go from Siena College to pretty much the furthest habitable place on Earth I could possibly live and work?

You can actually trace this back to my days here at Siena College and in particular two Science teachers to whom I am enormously grateful, Ms Merriweather and Mr Bunn. They identified that I was a "wee bit nerdy" and might benefit from the opportunity to attend a two week International Science School run by the University of Sydney. This was my first real taste of the international nature of a scientific career and my first exposure to the idea that there were questions for which we genuinely didn't know the answer. I was hooked by the idea that when you asked a teacher "why does this happen?" the reply could be "no one knows... and it's not easy to figure out but it's an important question".

This curiosity and excitement about uncovering the unknown is something that has driven me forward through a university degree, a PhD and now all the way to the other side of the world, and is something I retain in my current job today.

At the moment I'm working on the fascinating conundrum of how our own immune system successfully receives and puts together many different external signals in order to identify and respond to harmful pathogens without mistakenly attacking parts of our own body. This is a huge and complex problem in which progress in our knowledge can have huge implications for improving human health, for example researchers (to be very clear, not me) are now using the knowledge we have about the immune response to reprogram immune cells to attack and destroy certain types of cancers. With the advances in technology and new discoveries about how the human body works, it is truly an exciting time to be a scientist!

Science is a team pursuit, and my development as a scientist and achievements in my scientific career to date that have led to this award have only been possible with the help of a multitude of people on many different levels. As such, I would specifically like to thank my PhD supervisors Professor Phil Hodgkin and Dr Susanne Heinzel and my post doctorate supervisor, Professor Doreen Cantrell who have all been pivotal mentors in my development once I entered my scientific training. More importantly, before any of this, my first scientific inspirations came from my family, my Grandpa and Mum in particular who both helped spark my passion for science through their curiosity about the world around them.

Goals worth achieving are rarely easily won, but I for one am thankful for trailblazers like Dr Ursula McKenna who have forged the path for women in STEM. They have paved the way, allowing me to follow my curiosity and passion and to contribute to the fundamental global challenge of improving human health. This ambition is not only possible but is a challenge in which I can thrive. I would encourage all of you to follow your own ambitions. Don't be afraid to strive for excellence and to take on the worthwhile but hard challenges.

Growing up in Australia, I stepped into the magic of stories every day, shedding my skin to try out different lives to test who I might be. In novels I discovered that girls could be heroes. Inspired by the words and the initiative of Melbourne based author Suzy Zail, Siena students embraced the opportunity to support the empowerment of young women in Africa through education. Generational Siena Families

For some families, the choice of Siena College to educate their daughters has become a tradition. In our current cohort of students, we have thirty-six mothers and four grandmothers who also attended the College.

In 2016, Therese Black, née Hickey was featured in an article in the Weekly Review which described how Therese, her three sisters and four daughters had all attended Siena College. To update the story; Madeleine, who was a Year 12 student in 2016, graduated from Siena and has joined her sisters Sarah, Bridget and Eliza as an alumna of the College. However, the connection with Siena remains intact as Therese returned to Siena College in 2019 as a member of the Mathematics Faculty.

The Carroll family has the distinction of having the greatest number of daughters enrolled at Siena. Seven sisters maintained the Carroll presence at Siena for twenty years. Beginning with Michelle and Therese who started in Year 8 in 1977 and ending with Kath who graduated from Year 12 in 1997. The siblings saw many changes at Siena in their shared time including an increase in student numbers from 430 to nearly 600 and the appointment of the first lay principal in 1995. Several of the Carroll sisters have since returned to Siena as guest speakers at the annual Siena College Careers Showcase and Simone's daughter Meg Curtin, who is currently in Year 11, will

soon mark the passing of another generation through the College.

Another family who has maintained a connection with the College across the generations is the Ovens family. Jessica Ovens (Year 12) and her sister Emily (Year 10) have followed their mother Tanya, née Grant and aunts, Fiona and Marina through the Siena College gates. Tanya herself has returned to Siena as a volunteer. She has been actively involved with Siena Parents' Association (SPA) and Friends of Music and Performing Arts (FOMPA).

The Mooring sisters; Judith Netting, Rose Marie Prosser and Ann Leonard all graduated from Siena Dominican Convent (as Siena College was then called) during the 1960s. Rose Marie maintained her links with Siena returning to teach Chemistry and Biblical Studies and then serving on the College Board. She also sent her daughters Katharine and Elizabeth Prosser to Siena in the 1980s. Kath McCarthy, née Prosser continues her mother's tradition of service to the Siena College community serving as the current Chair of the College Board. Kath's daughters Alannah (Year 10) and Tess (Year 8) are the third generation of this family to attend Siena.
