Welcome to our new Board Members



Chair of the Siena College Board, Judith Potter (Class of 1973)

Judith Potter (pictured above) was one of seven sisters who attended Siena College. Given that the school only had about three hundred and fifty students at that time, the Potter girls would have made up a reasonable percentage of the school population, even though they were not enrolled together at the same time.

As a child, Judith suffered a great deal from asthma and was often absent from school. But she soon learnt that challenges are to be met full on, and she went on to edit both the school magazine, *Incoll*, and the yearbook. She was also a member of the debating team, an experience that has paid dividends throughout her career as a teacher and principal. Judith claims that debating gave her the confidence to speak publicly and think on her feet.

While Judith has spent her career in the teaching sector, there was a time she considered a change. However, during the interview process for a non teaching job she realised that she really did want to remain where she was. Sometimes we just need to be reminded of what means the most to us.

Judith comes to Siena College with forty-two years of experience as an educator in Catholic, government and independent schools. She was most recently Principal of Loreto College, Ballarat for almost fifteen years, retiring in 2020. For over fifteen years, she has been a member of the Invergowrie Foundation (TIF) Finance and Risk Committee and Council. The core of the foundation is supporting the advancement of girls' education across Victoria.

Dominican News



The Dominican Sisters chose the Feast of St Catherine of Siena for the ceremony to mark the occasion of the transfer of the Siena property to Dominican Education Australia (DEA). This historical event sees the end of the sisters' formal ownership of the property. The sisters purchased the Siena site and original house in 1926 where they lived until the convent was completed in 1939. The sisters maintained the ownership and governance of the College until the establishment of Dominican Education Australia in 2015. Since 2016 DEA has responsibility for oversight of the governance of six education ministries in the Dominican tradition across New South Wales. Victoria and South Australia.

Sr Mary-Clare Holland OP, Prioress and Sr Julianna Drobik OP, Trustee were joined by the small group of local sisters, DEA Board Chair, Eileen Young, Siena Board Chair, Judith Potter and Principal, Elizabeth Hanney for the moving ritual in the Siena Chapel. Candles representing the past, present and future were lit and words of remembrance and gratitude were said as part of the liturgy leading up to the signing over of the land and buildings to the DEA Trustees and Siena College Board. The Sisters gifted a plaque to the College acknowledging the significance of the occasion.

While the closing of this era brings a sadness, the sisters entrust with confidence the mission to provide Catholic education in the Dominican tradition at Siena College to the Trustees of Dominican Education Australia and the College Board.



Dominican Family in Ukraine

The Coordinator of Dominican Sisters International (DSI), Sr Margaret Mayce OP, (based in Rome) has been sending updates to Dominican sisters internationally regarding sisters in Ukraine. (Sr Margaret visited Siena in 2015 and spoke to Year 11 students). Different congregations of Dominican sisters from Spain, Poland and Hungary as well as Dominican Friars are on mission in Ukraine. News received in the early days of the crisis indicated the sisters were assisting women and children to escape the war by organising travel across the border into Poland and Spain. The displacement of millions of citizens, lives lost and the devastating destruction of so much of the country continues to escalate with no end in sight. We pray with the global community for all the people caught up in this catastrophic war, and for neighbouring countries managing the humanitarian crisis with the arrival of millions of refugees.

Mission and Identity

2022 College Theme: In Truth and Action

If we have learned anything from the past couple of years, it would be that our Siena experience does not happen in 'isolation': we are far more than just a collection of individuals. This was also evident in the early Christian communities, where a sense of identity was forged through continuing to live the message of Jesus:

For this is the message you have heard from the beginning, that we should love one another...

How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses to help?

Let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action.

1 John 3:11, 17-18

The purpose of this First Letter of John is to critique the 'popular' ideas of the time and to deepen the spiritual and social awareness of the first Christians. It emphasises striking contrasts between light and darkness, truth and error in order to illustrate the challenges and responsibilities of Christian life. Language has the power to either separate or connect us; when we create a place of encounter for our students to fully enter into meaningful dialogue, we enable them to develop the skills necessary for negotiating their own search for truth: their *Veritas*.

Edward Schillebeeckx OP said that as Dominicans we are committed to:

- Taking up the story of Jesus and living it in our own time
- Speaking and seeking truth in all its forms
- Recognising that the function of truth is to liberate through our actions

Our 2022 College Theme impels us to love in truth and action: to take the initiative in connecting beyond ourselves. It encourages us to consider the following in our contemporary Catholic context:


- Who are we as a community of faith?
- Where are we called to be present?
- What do we sav and do?

Justice Education



Our 2022 College theme, In Truth and Action, invites the Siena Community to examine how we are working towards Reconciliation at Siena. Our formal commitment to Reconciliation is embedded in our Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) which documents specific actions in the classroom, around the school and within the community to which we are committed to undertaking. Though undeniably a valuable acknowledgement of our Commitment to Reconciliation, the value of Siena's RAP is felt not in the intention, but rather in the actions we undertake on a regular and ongoing basis which demonstrate this commitment.

In Term 1, the FIRE Carriers (Friends Igniting Reconciliation through Education) have been committed to learning and reflecting to inform our actions. We met together on the Anniversary of the Apology to the Stolen Generations to consider the progress Australia has made since this historic day, but also the role we have in continuing to 'do the work' to address the ongoing injustices facing our First Nations People. This requires us to enter into not only historic, but



also contemporary truths
which are challenging and
uncomfortable for non
indigenous Australians.
As we acknowledge these
truths, we then work to
take action. Meaningful
action. Ongoing action.
Heartfelt action. Opportunities
for learning and personal growth have
continued throughout Term 1 as the FIRE
Carriers have worked with Aboriginal
Consultant, Tarina Fanning.

In Cultural Competency workshops held after school, Tarina explored issues such as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Identity, Culture, Kinship and Terminology. She also explored the importance of Reconciliation Week, Naidoc Week, Treaty and the Uluru Statement from the Heart.

To live *In Truth and Action* requires us to live with open hearts, minds and hands. To listen, to learn, to create. To be Change Makers. What a wonderful opportunity we have.

Student Formation

The Student Representative Council (SRC) has been busy in Term 1, organising activities to support various organisations and to provide Siena students with the opportunity to respond personally to the College Theme: *In Truth and Action*. Their focus has been to raise awareness of the work of specific organisations and the benefits for individuals in 'caring for our Common Home', working to support the vulnerable and making a difference in the lives of others. This has been most obvious with the Caritas Project Compassion Lenten campaign and celebrating the work of the women involved in the Kopanang Project.

SRC activities and initiatives include: art competitions, nude food challenges, bake sales, the International Women's Day / Kopanang raffle, public speaking events that responded to the 'For Future Generations' theme, as well as physical activities such as the 'Walk With Water Challenge', which was about walking in solidarity with children who travelled long distances by foot on a daily basis to collect water for family and communities.





We were unable to gather for the International Women's Day Breakfast on Tuesday, 8 March, to celebrate with community members, staff and students, as well as to hear from alumna, Professor Louise Bennett (Class of 1979). To mark the occasion, our students created visuals responding to the 2022 theme, #BreakTheBias and the SRC organised a raffle to support the 'Project Dignity' campaign for the women in the Kopanang Community.

The Year 7 Pillars Leadership program, which took place between Week 6 to 8 of Term 1, provided students with the opportunity to engage in discussions about leadership qualities and styles. The program supported their understanding of Dominican leadership and the identification of role models, which provided inspiration to each student's leadership journey, as well as increased their awareness of effective leadership characteristics and what they saw as admirable qualities in selected leaders.

Here is what our current elected student leaders have to say to our Year 7 students regarding leadership:

"In Year 7, I came to Siena alone without anyone from my primary school, and was warmly welcomed by teachers and older students, helping me to settle (almost immediately!) into the new school environment. I do thank the cordiality of the teachers, but I would like to say a special thank you to the amazing student leaders. Although I did not know any of the leaders personally, I was in awe of the way in which they bonded me to Siena, making each day less intimidating. For this reason, I longed to be a leader, in making the students of Siena feel at home, just as I did. It was only till Year 12, that I obtained the courage to enter the leadership realm, and I am very glad that I went ahead with it! Being able to promote student voice, allows for a range of issues to be raised and addressed, in which I believe is integral in driving change in our broader community. Being a leader will make you realise your potential as a young woman with the knowledge and astounding experiences gained."

"Student voice is important as it is your school and whatever changes that you help make, will result in a better school for all to enjoy."







"The positives of actively contributing to leadership at Siena, include hearing what is new to the school firsthand and being able to help others who are unsure of what to do."



"I encourage you to always be authentic and true to yourself when applying for a leadership role. There is no one set 'type' of leader that you must aim to be, just be you, and be proud of the fact you are putting yourself out there to serve the Siena community. I encourage you to not be disheartened if you are unsuccessful the first time round, as there will always be another opportunity right around the corner! Remember to jump at all opportunities that come your way, and it does not always have to be a leadership related role."







Learning and Teaching

Learning by Doing

As a Dominican school, we aim to engage our students in a challenging education that empowers them with the personal resources to make a difference in the world, by searching for truth through a culture of lifelong learning. To assist with bringing our College Mission to life, we have welcomed new staff members who have increased our capacity to provide challenging learning opportunities for our students, within and beyond the classroom.

Head of Albertus Magnus Learning Centre, Roxanne Summer, shares an interest in all things library, as well as a passion for combining critical and creative thinking in the STEAM space. This has seen our Year 10 students immerse themselves in projects: conceptualisation, design, creation to testing, along with developing their negotiation and collaboration skills. Below are details of two projects on the go!



Flying High in Year 10 Science

Year 10 Science elective students are involved in the STEAM and Crash and Burn classes this semester. They have learned about basic theories of physics and aerodynamics. During Week 9 and 10, the two classes applied this knowledge to the field of aviation.

In cross-class groups, students built a standard model aircraft from balsa wood. Their aircraft was then tethered to a Centrifugal Thrust Generator (CTG) which allowed the aircraft to fly in the classroom. As they flew the aircraft, students recorded data to determine distance travelled, average speed, acceleration and lift.

After the initial flight, students chose one aspect of their aircraft to modify: angle of stabiliser, size of stabiliser, wing aspect ratio, and weight or voltage of the CTG. Once the modifications were made, students predicted the effect of the change on the aircraft's flight behaviour and repeated the flight testing and data recording. Groups then theorised as to why the intended effect did or did not occur.













Spaghetti Machine Contest

Students have been invited to participate in the University of Melbourne Amazing Spaghetti Machine Contest.

Teams will compete to build the most amazing 'spaghetti machine', which is an overly complex device that performs a relatively simple task. We have a small team of keen students who will be joining the competition and we will keep you updated on their progress. All this enthusiasm bodes well for our upcoming Veritas building that will be dedicated to the STEAM offerings. We look forward to sharing updates throughout the year!

Student Wellbeing Updates

We often seek serenity when we are faced with difficult times. When our patience and poise are critically tested, that is when we strive most resolutely for serenity. This year, the Wellbeing Team has been able to offer Year 7 students and new students from other year levels a wide variety of activities to support their transition into a new school setting. The Transition program they participated in, aims to help them build connections within the Siena community, as well as to establish growth mindsets for progressive improvement and compassion for one another.

In 2022, the Wellness program will have a key focus for each term. In collaboration with the Learning Centre, we continue to update the Wellbeing Collection available for loan to all students. Introduced in 2019, it serves to provide important information surrounding mental health and wellbeing to students in a relaxed and discreet manner. Recommended reads include Note to Self: The secrets of calm by Rebekah Ballagh, You can live on the bright side by Lucy Bell and many more.

The Kind Mind Club is a new program offered by the Wellbeing Team this year. It is a space for Year 7 students to gather on Fridays. Term 1's focus was on friendships, mindfulness and organisation. In Term 2, students will be looking at self care, academic stamina and growth in the classroom.

Development at Siena

Master Plan: Stage 1 Veritas

Following the release of the College Master Plan, the Project Working Group (PWG) has continued to develop and finalise Stage 1 Veritas. In understanding the links between aesthetically appealing surroundings and successful educational outcomes, a major focus has been the creation of attractive external environments. This includes extensive landscaping and the beautification of the Siena grounds, including the greening of the campus through sustainability, as well as acknowledging that Siena College stands on the sacred lands of the Wurundjeri people.

Student voice will be integral in providing feedback and suggestions for this next stage. During Term 2, the architects and landscape architect will meet with students to incorporate their ideas and suggestions.

Reintroduction of Food Studies

A purpose built Food Studies area will be included on the ground level of the Veritas Centre with vegetable gardens and decks. Gathering spaces and opportunities for hospitality have also been included.

Innovation Precinct

Students and staff can develop innovative projects in the Maker Space through hands on design, art, technology and construction. It promotes a blend of disciplines that can ignite creative thinking and spark new invention.

Green Roof

The Veritas Centre will have a green roof, which is a flat roof surface that has a growing medium over a waterproof membrane planted partially with vegetation. Benefits include:

- Reduced heating and cooling requirements for the building
- · Reduced and slowed stormwater runoff
- Improved sound insulation
- Carbon sequestration
- · Capture of gaseous and particulate pollutants
- Alleviation of urban heat island effects
- Increased biodiversity






















































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Introducing New Staff


Alumnae Wall Inscriptions for 2021/22

Asked about her SPA memories, Penny nominates the 2015 Siena Colour Run in Wattle Park as one of her favourites. "Arriving at Wattle Park at 6.00am in the morning to set up the food stalls ... it was wonderful seeing the SPA team bring to life such a beautiful offering of food and drinks. It was a true sense of community." Looking to the future, the current committee have plans to continue to grow SPA membership, to create a SPA alumnae group and to reinstate the Siena bookstall whilst continuing with the ever popular Mother's and Father's Day breakfasts and the annual raffle.
