From the Principal

The Rock by TS Eliot

*The Eagle soars in the summit Heaven,
The Hunter with his dogs pursues his circuit.
O perpetual revolution of configured stars,
O perpetual recurrence of determined seasons,
O world of spring and autumn, birth and dying!
The endless cycle of idea and action,
Endless invention, endless experiment,
Brings knowledge of motion, but not of stillness;
Knowledge of speech, but not of silence;
Knowledge of words, and ignorance of the Word.
All our knowledge brings us nearer to our ignorance,
All our knowledge brings us nearer to death,
But nearness to death no nearer to God.
Where is the life we have lost in living?
Where is the wisdom we have lost in knowledge?
Where is the knowledge we have lost in information?
The cycles of Heaven in twenty centuries
Bring us farther from God and nearer to the dust.*

Written nearly a century ago in 1934, TS Eliot seems to be making two points. Here Eliot is flagging the dangers of a knowledge society based on an endless, unthinking search for knowledge that is 'uncoupled' with the experience of what it means to live a good life. A life of connection with the cycles of creation, a life of relationship, space and time for living, a recognition of the sacred wisdom that lies within and beyond us: *Where is the life we have lost in the living? Where is the wisdom we have lost in knowledge?*

Eliot is perhaps also endeavouring to 'relink' knowledge and faith, following an era which emphasised scientific reasoning and the relegation of faith and belief to rational thought, rather than relational mystery and source of wisdom. As a poet with great influence and cultural authority in his day, Eliot seems to be issuing a message to his society that for all the greatness of the human mind, we must also heed the warning to stay connected to mystery, wonder and deep humanity.

What has this reflection got to do with our time, our College community, our young people, our world? Despite being written last century, it perhaps offers us pause for thought, to consider our own time and place. As educators in the Dominican Catholic Tradition, we do subscribe to this integration of knowledge and

wisdom, faith and fullness of life. Never more so than in our times, we seek for our young people to gain an appreciation of our connection with and responsibility for our shared common home, the Earth, and for our interdependence on God and each other.

Our Dominican Tradition states it this way:

At its heart, the Dominican charism is characterised by the energetic, purposeful and dynamic search for truth (veritas), which emerges from thoughtful contemplation. The Dominican motto, 'to contemplate and share with others the fruits of contemplation' underlines the fact that the Dominican charism is a living tradition, alive and continuing to evolve.

As Dominicans, we recognise that the search for truth leads us to a personal graced encounter with the God who is our centre. Dominican educators strive to inspire students to wakefulness, a wakefulness to wonder and awe, to beauty and joy. Learners are challenged to discover the Holy One in our world, and to recognise the innate dignity and creativity of each person. Such qualities are intrinsic to the Dominican tradition and encourage an eagerness to pursue the search for truth. Dominican educators are weavers of the thread of the tapestry that creates the ongoing Dominican story.

From the College Board



It was such a delight to learn earlier this term that our Principal, Elizabeth Hanney, had been shortlisted as Principal of the Year in the Australian Education Awards 2023.

Being shortlisted is in itself is an outstanding achievement. This news would not have come as a surprise to any community member who has had the opportunity to witness the discerning, innovative and inclusive leadership of Elizabeth since her commencement as Siena College Principal in 2020. As in all schools, the challenges faced are complex. Elizabeth's open, warm and considered approach have shone through. She leads and influences change with her actions matching her words. Elizabeth is an exemplary CEO, supporting the Board and Board Committees in formation and all aspects of governance. I am sure all community members would like to join with me in congratulating Elizabeth.

The College Board meets twice each term. Our role is a governance one. The work of the four Board Committees (Finance, Policy, Strategic Property and Risk) informs and supports the work of the Board to ensure all governance responsibilities and accountabilities are met. Each year, a combined Board and Board Committee inservice, ably supported by senior staff, is held. A key focus is that of formation in the Dominican Tradition, with this year's engaging presentation led by Director of Formation, Sr Sheila Flynn OP. The College Leadership Team also provided an update on enrolments, finances, the Masterplan and cyber security.

Siena has undertaken an external Victorian Registration and Curriculum Authority (VRQA) review this year. I acknowledge the work of senior staff along with the contribution of all staff in the extensive preparation required over many months. The Board and committee members were delighted to hear that initial feedback includes the achievement of perfect score on all aspects of compliance, including that of Child Safety.

I extend my good wishes to all Siena community members.

Dominican News

Oceania Federation Meeting

In April, leaders and delegates across the five congregations of Dominican women in Oceania met in Auckland, New Zealand. This is an annual meeting but due to COVID, the first gathering since 2019.

The program included a focus on climate change with Pope Francis' encyclical, *Laudato Si*, as the primary source text. Guest speaker, Mary Betz, with a background in ecology and theology, guided the group's reflection, providing much stimulus for discussion: *Where are we now? Where do we want and need to be?*

During the days spent together, each congregation spoke about their particular group's activities and challenges faced over the past year, including aging members and declining numbers.

A liturgy was also held to remember the thirty-three Sisters who have died since the last gathering in 2019. A photo of each Sister, together with words of remembrance, laughter and tears were shared.

Annual Memorial Mass

The Memorial Mass for deceased alumnae, families of alumnae, parents and staff in the Siena community will be celebrated by Fr Kevin Toomey OP in the Siena Chapel on Thursday, 9 November 2023.

Organised by the Alumnae Association, this annual gathering in November offers an opportunity to pray and remember loved ones who have died over the past year. Following the celebration of the Eucharist, guests will gather for supper in the staff lounge to share memories.

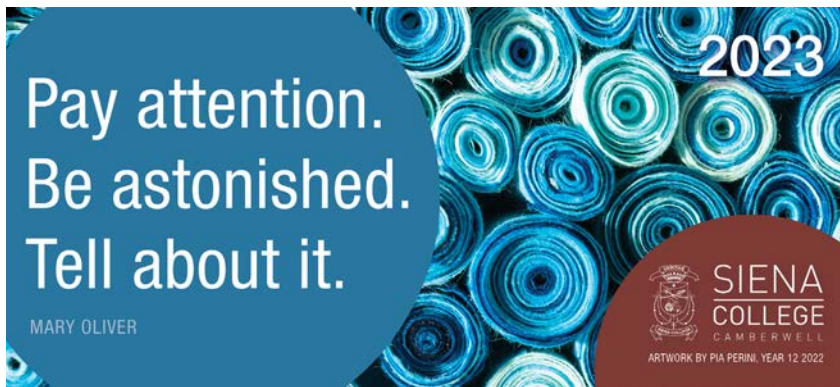

Year 7 Dominican Day

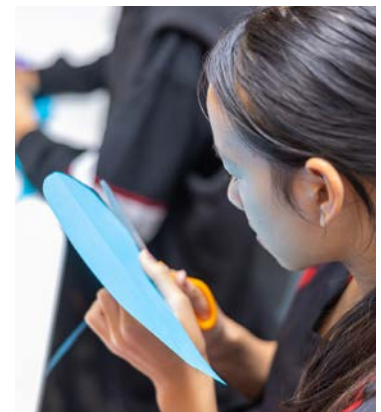

Learning and Teaching

The Learning Centre offers a variety of lunchtime clubs for students to hone their creative skills throughout the week.

Monday Maker's Club

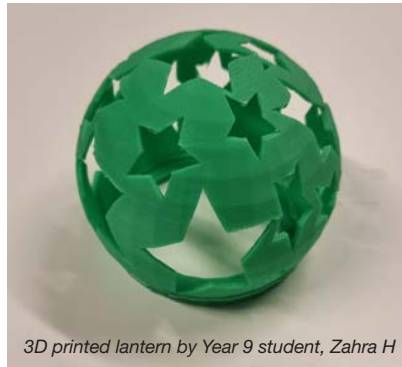
This club gives students space and materials to create using their imaginations. Students are presented with various projects to participate in, but are also free to explore their own projects and areas of interest. Projects included a 3D printed lantern to contain a battery operated tea light, and a 3D desktop name plate meant for a birthday.

Exploration of 3D printing enables spatial skill development and an understanding of technology limitations (a 3D printer can only print in one colour at a time). Year 7 student, Arianna G's 3D printed desktop name plate design was printed in several parts to allow for different colours and varying orientations, so as to ensure the best results (pictured right).

During Coding Club on Wednesdays, Arianna also created an interactive birthday card to accompany the 3D printed desktop name plate birthday gift she made. Utilising the Scratch coding platform by MIT University, she coded the birthday card. Arianna's code included custom sounds and animations, thanks to the 'broadcast' command she learned, allowing events to be triggered in sequence without user interaction.



A QR code link to the project was then generated to be included in the interactive birthday card. Have a look!

Registered as Shadow Judges, the student group will evaluate the six titles against the same criteria as the official judges. Student votes will contribute to the official Shadow Judge's Award, announced at the end of National Book Week. The Shadow Judging team is also supported by a mentor from the Victorian CBCA branch. Winners will collaborate on a creative response to the title and share this with the wider community.

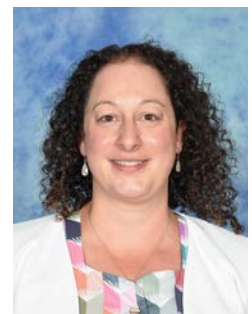

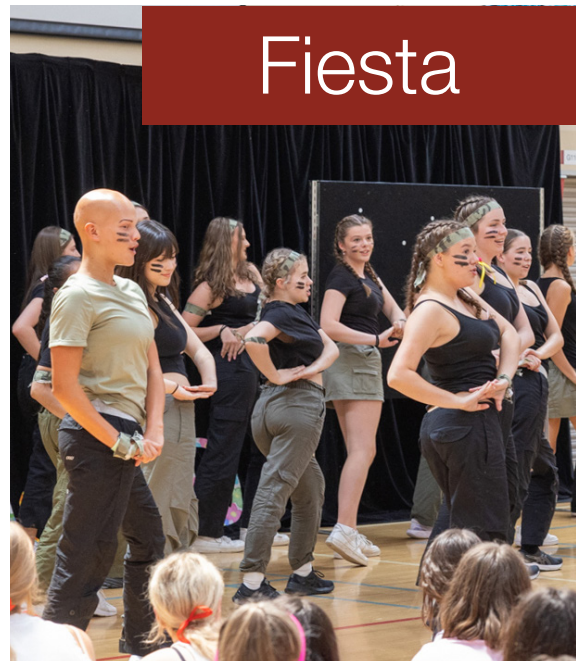

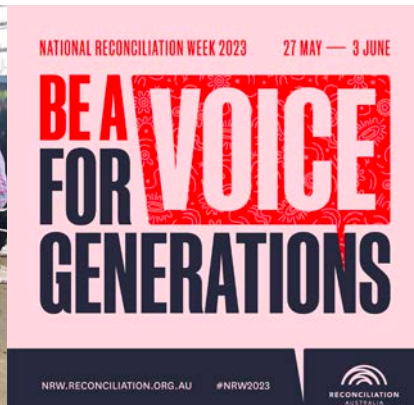

Reconciliation Week 2023

As we recognise Reconciliation Week at Siena College, we are reminded of monumental moments in our Nation's History, lines in the sand that altered the narrative of our national storytelling and shifted the focus to that of truth telling. Reconciliation Week commences annually on 27 May, the date of the successful 1967 Referendum that elected to include Aboriginal people as citizens of our country and no longer as items of flora and fauna. Reconciliation Week concludes on the 3 June, the date of the High Court ruling on Mabo in 1992.

Recognising Reconciliation Week in 2023 once again provided the opportunity for Australians to reflect on the significant historical moment of our time, as our nation prepares to vote later in the year in a Referendum on issues pertaining to our First Peoples. The theme for Reconciliation Week 2023 was *Be A Voice for Generations*.

Our FIRE Carriers were invited to attend the Long Walk hosted by Aquinas College in Ringwood, walking in solidarity with other Catholic Schools from Melbourne. The first Long Walk in Australia took place in 2004 when Michael Long walked from

Melbourne to Canberra to meet with the then Prime Minister, John Howard, with the aim of raising awareness of issues relating to Aboriginal people.

As Dominicans, we are committed to searching for Truth and then through this gaining of knowledge, compelled to speak Truth. Siena College is committed to recognising, teaching, learning, questioning and dialoguing about Reconciliation and issues pertaining to our First Peoples. These actions underpin our Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), ensuring that our community is educated and empowered to be a voice for generations.

Student Formation

In amongst the busyness and energy that is a school environment, it has been wonderful to see the 2023 student leaders respond in devising, planning, generating interest amongst their peers and facilitating a range of activities throughout this semester. The 2023 College Theme has been woven through our work and as Dominicans, we go to where the need is – we have had to *pay attention* and *tell about it*, in terms of the circumstances of others and the work of organisations in supporting these individuals. I have *been astonished* with the range of undertakings that the SRC have gone about navigating on top of their student responsibilities and expectations that come with their roles.

We have actively supported the work of Caritas with our Project Compassion initiatives that ran over the second half of Term 1. The SRC ran activities such as the Project Compassion Chalk Walk, which saw students transforming our path to the Agora Gardens with artwork and words, celebrating what they were grateful for and spreading awareness of the needs of others. The coin line was another way that students could raise funds and collaborate amongst students in their respective Houses. Always looking for new ideas, we ran the Siena Blind Auction where students were able to bid on items, with the catch that they did not know the exact item they could potentially win, having only been informed of the range of items on offer.

The generosity of SRC teams who donated goods and a Siena family with their Mecca hampers ensured that there were many auction items.

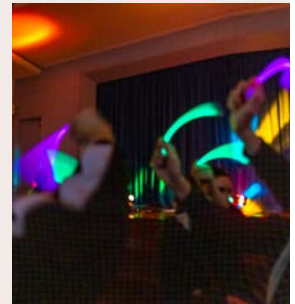

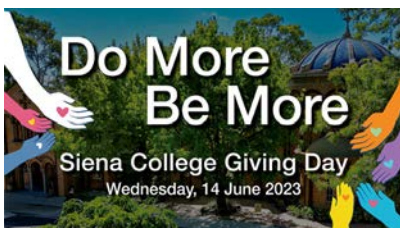

ASPIRE Program

In Semester 1, we welcomed the following primary schools to Siena College for our ASPIRE Program: St Timothy's Primary School, Wattle Park Primary School, Hartwell Primary School, St Bridget's Primary School, Our Lady's Primary School and Solway Primary School. The ASPIRE Program invites primary school students to work with Siena students on STEAM based activities. STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Mathematics) education is an integrated curriculum designed to equip students with knowledge in these five disciplines as they gain invaluable experience solving problems for which there is not one right answer.

The 2023 ASPIRE Program explores properties of different materials and the STEAM foundations of hypothesising, testing, observing and applying findings. Students participated in hands-on engineering activities, creating cardboard structures and lighting them up with sustainable energy.



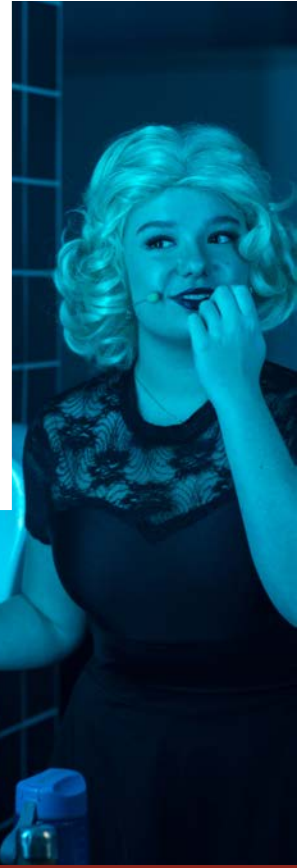

Spotlight on Siena Staff

Spotlight on Siena Staff is an ongoing series capturing the reflections, motivations and advice from some of our amazing Siena College staff. In this issue, we feature Head of Mathematics, Nick Roussidis, and Director of Learning and Innovation, Anne Rogan.

Nick, what do you love most about working as an educator?

I love working and building positive relationships with students each and every day. My favourite thing to witness is when students have a 'lightbulb' moment (when the student finally 'gets' a concept that they may have been experiencing some difficulty with). I think this shows the student that persistence, grit and perseverance will eventually help you to succeed.

What appeals to you most about teaching in a Catholic school?

To be able to adopt a holistic approach in developing students with the Catholic lens at the forefront. Using specific Catholic pillars to promote learning and support students in applying them beyond the classroom.

Who were your favourite teachers growing up?

My favourite teachers were always the ones that went the extra mile to build positive relationships with their students. This is why I place such a high emphasis on developing positive relationships with every student in my classes.

What advice would you give to your younger self starting out in the system?

Embrace the challenge. Throw yourself in the deep end and absorb as much information from experienced colleagues as you can. Celebrate your successes and ensure you spend time developing your physical and mental health, as teaching is a profession that is highly demanding at times.

What do you think Siena College does really well?

Siena's ability to not only develop the student, but to also develop the 'whole person' through various approaches centred around our Dominican values.

Anne, how did you become involved in teaching / working as an educator? How did it all begin?

I had been working in the Publishing industry for many years but was ready for a change, and I had always been drawn to teaching. Both my father and sister also worked in the Education industry so I felt like I knew what to expect. I resigned from my job at Penguin Books and pursued a teaching degree at Monash University. I also have an Arts and Law degree.

What appeals to you most about teaching in a single-sex school?

I enjoy working with young women and a single-sex school offers them the chance to shine without the distraction of boys. There is a great opportunity to engage these young women heading out into the world, hoping to make a difference.

Do you remember your first day at work as a 'newly minted' educator?

I remember one of my first days at work, running into one of the other graduate teachers in the yard and both of us feeling like we had no idea what we should be doing. But in hindsight, things actually started to fall into place pretty quickly. I also remembered seeing a group of Year 7s touring the school and they definitely looked more terrified than I felt!

What would your advice be to a parent who is looking for a secondary school for their child.

Whatever school you choose, it needs to be the right fit for your child. Trust your gut instinct – the feeling you get when you tour the school is a good indication of the school's learning environment. It is definitely worth speaking to some current students – they are the best ambassadors and can honestly answer your questions.

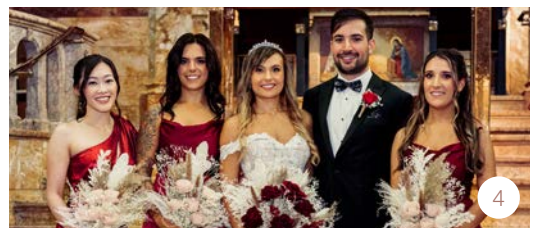


Births and Marriages

From the Archives

In December 2023, one of Siena's longest serving teaching staff members, Bernie Daly (back row, seventh from the left), retired after more than three decades. I had the opportunity to spend some time to learn about his career path and the joy he derived from it.

Working as an auditor in the 1980s, Bernie decided to switch career paths – after attaining his Bachelor of Education, the rest is history. He accepted a job offer at Siena in 1989 after driving past the school. He witnessed building works occurring and thought *“the school must be going places”*. Bernie taught Accounting, then Economics and eventually, the newly introduced Business Management subject in the early 2000s. After gaining a Graduate Diploma from Christ College, Religious Education was added to his teaching load.

Bernie joined the Finance Committee as the staff representative, and with his accounting background *“knew what the reports were about”*. This was a time of large building projects, and he was proud of his efforts to convince the other committee members, with then College Principal, Gaynor Robson-Garth's support, that a third floor on the St Catherine Centre was necessary, and the school could afford the repayments during the time of low interest rates.

Whilst teaching has been a joy – seeing those lightbulb moments when a girl says *“I get it”* – sport was Bernie's passion. An avid tennis player himself, Bernie was happy to coach the GSV tennis teams for many years. When football was introduced as well, Bernie became a field umpire which *“kept him fit for tennis”*. Many past students reading this will have fond memories of being on camps and Year 12 retreats with *“Mr D”*. Bernie also noted that technology has been one of the many

changes to the school since 1990. Before online learning and individual devices, the *“modern”* technology included two TVs with VCRs mounted on a mobile stand. As they could not be taken upstairs, room changes were common, and the paper booking sheet proved contentious at times as to whose class would get to use the TVs.

When asked about his future plans, he replied *“more tennis... I'll be able to play the old geezers during the week now...”*, getting along to all the games of his beloved Collingwood, and travelling. He and his wife are looking forward now to becoming *“grey nomads”*.

He is also hoping to volunteer for Vision Australia to use his distinctive voice to read the news on the radio. His final words for the Siena community: *“Keep the great Dominican vibe going... and keep singing the Hymn to St Catherine with gusto!”*
