From the Principal

Siena College reflects a commitment to education as a source of hope, fostering peace, justice, beauty and truth.

Rooted in a Catholic Dominican context, our philosophy draws inspiration from St Dominic. St Catherine and their model, Jesus Christ. In navigating the digitalised and globalised twenty-first century, emphasis is placed on the six big C skills: critical thinking, collaboration, communication, creativity, citizenship and character education. Post-pandemic, the need for connection, customisation and coherence has surfaced, advocating for an education that goes beyond workforce

Amidst this evolving educational landscape, several accomplishments at Siena College stand out in 2023:

- The Siena in Siena Italy Immersion provided a transformative experience for twenty-five students. It was an exploration of our Dominican roots intertwined with the rich tapestry of Italian arts and culture, and a journey of self discovery.
- We were pleased this year to see a number of very significant projects come to life: our Reconciliation Action Plan, FIRE Carriers Day and the successful production of Chicago: High School Edition. The initiatives aimed at cultivating belonging and connection across the four Houses found their most significant expression in the revamped Fiesta format. This dynamic shift saw a multitude of students actively involved, guided by student leaders and supported by the Heads of House.

- The Write a Book in a Day program, spearheaded by Head of Albertus Magnus Learning Centre, Roxanne Summer, facilitated literacy, creativity, collaboration and relational learning.
- Across learning disciplines, students engaged in numerous extension opportunities. We appreciate the various pathways offered to Siena students, including Vocational Education and Training (VET) programs, passion pathways alongside the regular curriculum, and engagement with Year 13 tutors for enhanced learning in Year 12. These offerings have earned us a spot among the Top 5 Catholic Schools in Melbourne.
- We were fortunate to celebrate St Dominic's Day, St Catherine's Day, and our opening and graduation masses as a whole school at St Dominic's parish.
- In our School Review and VRQA process this year, successful compliance across domains, and recognition as a school of best practice and continuous improvement affirmed Siena College's commitment to its mission. The Leadership Team and College Board were instrumental in this success

Amidst these highlights, daily activities in classrooms - encounters, engagement, challenges and support thrive through robust teacher-student relationships, expert pedagogical practices and personalised attention to each student's growth. Facilitated by exceptional leaders at Faculty, House and Director

levels, all within a culture of teamwork and an unwavering commitment to excellence.

Dominican News





In August 2023, Dominican Sister, Trish Madigan joined a group of Christian women in Canberra as part of the Micah Women Leaders (MWL) Delegation to Parliament House.

This network brings together women Christian leaders across the Australian Church to engage with federal politicians warmly and relationally, leading to significant outcomes on key issues of global justice. Forty-five women from twelve Church denominations met with forty-three politicians from the major parties

(Australian Greens, Australian Labor Party, the Coalition and the Independents).

The group met with politicians to discuss the role Australia can play globally in helping to create a safer world for all – helping to end extreme poverty, fight climate change, reduce inequality, and to lift its aid budget and leadership in the Pacific. All received a positive and productive response from politicians. These discussions were particularly timely as they coincided with the release of the government's new International Development Policy.

Sr Trish passed on papers prepared by Sr Tabiria Tabeaua OP on the experience of the Solomon Islands to each politician.

The Minister for International Development and the Pacific, Mr Pat Conroy, also addressed the group, asking Church leaders to play a role in their communities to address the moral need for an increase in Australia's aid budget. The group responded, stressing the collective desire of women leaders across the Church, civil society, and business for strong and effective government action on behalf of the world's most vulnerable.

Mission and Identity

Our 2023 College Theme, *Pay Attention. Be Astonished. Tell About It.* has been lived out by Siena staff and students this year. As Dominicans, we always need to see the 'big' picture – in this case, the global picture of our Catholic Christian tradition. Fr Timothy Radcliffe OP says "it is imperative we do this in order to keep our charism recognisable, credible and meaningful for our people." In 2023, who are 'our people'? Our Siena students, families, staff and community. Across this year, our people have lived the theme authentically in many ways:

Paying attention to our world: classroom learning has been enhanced and extended by social justice initiatives including supporting our Dominican Sisters locally and in the Solomon Islands, the Kopanang Community in South Africa, Vinnies and Caritas Australia. As their parting gift to the College, the Class of 2023 made a generous donation to Kopanang families to provide school uniforms.

Being astonished by the signs and symbols around us: wellness sessions have highlighted our ability to be both grateful and outward looking, with cocurricular offerings drawing us into moments of achievement and celebration. Our College's natural surroundings have continued to provide us with spaces for reflection and conversation.

Telling about it: the Year 12 Retreat, Dominican Days and Staff Formation Sessions have seen the continuation of our story, in the context of listening to the voices of those on the margins. In VCE Religion and Society, Year 10 students engaged with Jewish Christian Muslim Association (JCMA) speakers, while Year 11 students entered into dialogue with Siena staff members in a Religion and Ethics panel.

Learning and Teaching

2023 Book Week saw students from Siena College and Hartwell Primary School participating in the Write a Book in a Day (WABIAD) program.

Thirty students from Years 7 to 10 worked in pairs as authors or illustrators, handling all aspects of book creation – from storyboarding and planning to creation and product delivery.

Initial Planning

The process began with a collaboration session with students from Hartwell Primary School, involving sharing picture books to determine target audience preferences and completing initial storyboarding.

Creation

On day two, held onsite at Siena College during Book Week, students created their books and participated in workshops led by our teachers. Demonstrations of the technical specifications required for printing were also included. Sessions included:

- Insights Into the Mind of a Grade 4 Student
 By Psychology Teacher, Devorah Waysman
- An Exploration of Cover Art and Typography
 By Head of The Arts and Technology, Claire Al-Noah
- Deciding What to 'Show' and What to 'Tell' By Head of English, Punita Mistry

In Term 4, the stories were completed in preparation for printing. With the purchase of International Standard Book Numbers (ISBNs), the books were officially published, and a copy of each will be contributed to the State Library of Victoria, becoming part of the literary history of Victoria.

Product Delivery

The final stage involved Siena students rejoining their Grade 4 junior collaborators and presenting Hartwell Primary School with a finished copy of their books. Students were thrilled to see their names on the dedication page. Tell about it.* They were then required to present a two to three minute impromptu speech on an unseen topic displaying their skills of logic and reason.

Our 2023 College Theme informed the ways we came together as a community to celebrate and acknowledge our students.

With a priority on student voice and agency, we remain dedicated to providing avenues for our students to share ideas about their College and to see these translated into action. The Respectful Relationships Student Team collaborated to identify some of the significant issues facing young people today. These ideas were worked into the Wellness Program and inspired our Body Confident Children and Teens Webinar in October, which was hosted by the Butterfly Foundation for Siena parents and the wider community. The session promoted practical information and tips on positive body image in the home throughout childhood and adolescence.

Dr Jessica Wong joined the Counseling Team in 2023, working alongside dedicated professionals, Lisa Ellis and Gemma Morley. Together, they have consistently supported students and families in navigating wellbeing challenges through evidence based strategies and personalised care. The Counseling Hub also warmly welcomed two exceptional Therapy Dogs, Coco and Rooey, who have played a vital role in providing support and care to our students. Coco and Rooey have been wholeheartedly embraced by the Siena community.

Child Safety remains a fundamental element of all our work with students. Heads of House, Stephanie Vangelista and Sophie Pryn (Cassia), Becky Scott (Dianella), Laine Rice (Kurrajong) and Lauren Seymour (Waratah) supported students by creating opportunities for connection through significant College events and various House activitites. In their daily interactions with students, they have lived the Dominican values and led by example.

Wellness Week took place in Term 3 and included the following activities: Highfield Park Nature Walk, Mindful Craft, Meditation Yoga, Circle Time with Therapy Dogs and a friendly staff versus students dodgeball competition. It was a fantastic time of building connections and friendships while promoting self care and growth mindsets.

It's All About Perspective

Iln 2023, Siena College aimed to cultivate empathy among our students by creating experiences of encounter, engagement and opportunities for reflection.

During Horizons Week, Year 9 students from Siena College and Xavier College participated in a combined City Social Justice Experience titled 'Naarm through a Different Lens'. Workshops by The Big Issue and Jesuit Social Services; city walks, exploration of Birrarung Maar, and visits to the Ecological Justice Hub and the CERES Community Environment Park allowed our students to view the city from alternative perspectives and to understand diverse lived experiences. Students then transitioned from the city to Xavier College, where they worked in groups to create social enterprise models addressing issues they had encountered. This pilot initiative empowered students to see themselves as potential solutions to global challenges.

On Wednesday, 26 July, the Siena College community gathered together for the Vinnies Australia Rug Up Day Fundraiser and reinforced our Dominican commitment to social justice, in conjunction with Wellbeing Week. It offered another opportunity for students to build empathy and appreciate everyday comforts. On a cold winter day, students were allowed to wear layers of warm clothing as classroom heating remained off. The initiative aimed to recognise the impact of rising living costs on families unable to afford heating, financially support Vinnies through student donations and reduce environmental impact by limiting electricity use. The students embraced the day with good spirits, recognising that small acts can make a significant difference in our world.

Student Formation

Working with student leaders is a privilege, offering insight into the concerns and interests of young people. Witnessing the power of teamwork, shared ideas, and a commitment to set and achieve goals is truly inspiring.

The Immersion provided our students with a unique opportunity to delve into Italian history, culture, art and cuisine, while enhancing their language skills and intercultural competence. All of this was set against the backdrop of the Carmelite Sisters' Fiftieth Anniversary Celebrations in Italy!

During the trip, staff and students attended the Synod Mass at the Vatican, celebrated by Pope Francis in honour of San Francesco D'Assisi. We extend our gratitude to Australia's Ambassador to the Holy See, Ms Chiara Porro for making this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity possible. In Rome, students explored the renowned Dominican Church, Santa Sabina and other historical sites. A heartfelt thanks to Dominican Sister Margaret Mayce OP for providing a comprehensive summary of our Dominican story.

In Tavarnelle, our students were warmly welcomed by the local community, receiving roses to honour St Thérèse of Lisieux (the 'Little Flower'). They also engaged with the local school, IC Barberino Tavarnelle. Throughout the journey, students captured symbols and images representing the connections between Siena College and the Dominican and Carmelite Traditions, creating meaningful mementos of their time in Morrocco. This immersive experience has nurtured cultural connections and deepened understanding of history and spirituality.
























Spotlight on Siena Staff


