From the Principal



Girls' Education: Developing Academic Buoyancy and the Dominican Way

An article recently published by the International Coalition of Girls' Schools (ICGS) highlighted Smith and Evans' research focused on the gender gap in STEM pathways, and the real impact of single sex schools on girls' interest and performance in STEM. They analysed data from the 2019 Trends in International Mathematics and Science Study (TIMSS) relating to close to six thousand Year 9 students' maths and science achievement outcomes. It was here that they found that girls who attended single sex schools had better maths and science results than their peers at coeducational schools.

One factor that could be influencing girls' performance is the explicit messaging at girls' schools that challenge gender stereotypes and *"empower girls to actively engage in STEM fields"* (Smith and Evans, 2024, p1). This is especially important when the messaging is strategic and shows how subjects like maths and science can be part of vibrant, rewarding careers that girls may wish to consider or pursue, as do many Siena graduates.

In another recent study, academic buoyancy in female students was studied with the view to better understanding why, despite girls typically demonstrating higher motivation and engagement than boys, they experience more keenly academic setback, adversity and challenge, which also lingers longer for girls than boys (Martin and Collie, 2021). These educational researchers identified 5Cs of academic buoyancy which help to support the development of resilience and achievement in girls, thus also boosting their learning and wellbeing; these being Confidence (self efficacy), Coordination (planning), Commitment (persistence), Control and Composure.

The researchers found that strategies relating to these 5Cs enabled female students to navigate adversity in three ways: firstly, by identifying their own cognition (thinking) about adversity; identifying possible behaviours to assist in responding to this adversity; and reflecting on how they manage their emotional responses. This study highlighted the importance of assisting young people to embrace a view of psychological health that includes feelings both easy and hard, helping them to find that they can withstand emotional discomfort, and ultimately be strengthened and liberated in doing so (Damour, 2020).

In the study involving Year 9 female students at a single sex school in Melbourne, Commitment and Coordination (persistence and planning) were identified as the most used academic buoyancy strategies by students, utilised most during problem solving scenarios. The factor of Coordination (planning) supported student ownership of learning through self regulation and taught students to break down learning tasks into manageable parts. The students reported the following outcomes: calm frame of mind, reduction of stress and overwhelm, greater sense of agency and capacity - all supporting wellbeing, confidence and achievement.

How does this learning theory and educational research sit within our Dominican context? As all members of our community are aware, the pillar of Study is one of four central pillars of what an integrated approach to learning and life looks like, in the Dominican Tradition. Study, Contemplation, Service and Community offer a holistic view for 'life buoyancy', underpinned by our faith tradition. For Dominicans, studying in the book of life is critical to our identity. The theory of educational researchers lends itself to examining how best we learn, how best we educate our young people in a changing world, and how best we offer them confidence and capacity to live into





their promise. Our weekly Wellness and Enhancement sessions, along with the expertise of teaching staff, Heads of House and senior leaders are testament to our enactment of the 5Cs at Siena.

Recently I returned to a great book, *Dominican Spirituality* by Erik Borgman, which always offers new insights. A simple listing of the chapter titles gives the reader a sense of what lies at the heart of the Dominican Tradition, as modelled by St Dominic and St Catherine. I offer these titles as a useful point for personal reflection. It seems to me that the very 5Cs that comprise academic buoyancy (confidence, coordination, commitment, control and composure) are very Dominican qualities!

- Life with the eyes of a living soul
- Life as a constant prayer –
 Catherine's Contemplation in Action
- Life as an antenna: in all things longing for a fulfilled life, a good attitude in everything

- Life as an open book: equality and humanity in the midst of difference

I commend this edition of *The Spirit* to all members of our community. It captures the spirit of Siena College in Semester 1, beautifully reflecting our 2024 College Theme inviting

all to live With Courage, Wisdom and Joy.

Situated in Strathfield, New South Wales, Santa Sabina is celebrating its one hundred and thirtieth anniversary. The Dominican Sisters arrived in 1894 from Maitland, New South Wales. Sisters, alumni, past and present parents, staff and friends celebrated this special anniversary at the gala dinner held at The Fullerton Hotel on Friday, 23 March.

Most Reverend Fr Gerard Timoner OP Visits Australia

Most Reverend Gerard Timoner OP, Master General of the Dominican Order visited Australia in April. Dominican Sisters, laity and friends joined the St Dominic's Parish community for a special Mass followed by a barbecue lunch. During his nine-year term, Fr Gerard is required to visit all the communities of friars around the world. The headquarters of the Order are at Santa Sabina in Rome. Fr Gerard is the eighty-eighth Master of the Order and only the fourth non-European to be elected Master in the Order's eight hundred and four year history.

2024 Veritas Dinner: A Night of Friendship and Insightful Discussions

Dominican Sisters, parishioners, alumnae, past and present staff, and Siena College Board members gathered in Melbourne on Thursday, 30 April to celebrate the feast day of St Catherine of Siena. The theme of the evening was *Friendship*. Guests watched an insightful talk by Fr Timothy Radcliffe OP at the Synod on Synodality in Rome last October. In a world marked by violence and division, our table discussions emphasised the importance of listening and fostering seemingly impossible friendships to promote peace and understanding.

Sr Teresa Tebaia OP Attends Anti Human Trafficking Workshop in Fiji

Dominican Sister, Teresa Tebaia OP from the Solomon Islands attended a training workshop in Fiji (pictured bottom right), along with nineteen other religious and lay women from Tonga, Samoa, Fiji, Vanuatu, Kiribati and Solomon Islands. Held in February, the aim of the workshop is to build a network and develop the skills to identify and prevent human trafficking within the Pacific regional communities. Ongoing team meetings and formation sessions are planned to take place via Zoom.

Talitha Kum is an international initiative dedicated to combating human trafficking and exploitation. Formally established in 2009 by the International Union of Superiors General (UISG), Talitha Kum promotes collaboration among networks organised at national, regional and continental levels.

At the heart of the Siena College Master Plan vision is the creation of environments where students can truly own their educational journey.

These spaces are designed to encourage engagement, promote social interaction and collaborative learning, and prioritise the overall wellbeing of our students.

In August this year, we will commence Stage 1 of our refined Master Plan, with the development of what will be known as the Veritas Precinct. The Veritas Precinct will transform the back of four houses on Compton Street into a contemporary space for our school community. It will include two full size multipurpose courts, several additional learning areas and outdoor landscaping with indigenous plantings – creating much needed green space on our beautiful campus. Siena in Siena Year 9 Program

We are excited to announce the launch our Siena in Siena Year 9 Program, commencing in 2026. The program will provide all Year 9 students at Siena College with an enriching educational experience in Tuscany, Italy.

During a three-week journey, students will fully engage with the local community in the heart of Tuscany, in a small town called Tavarnelle, experiencing Italian culture and traditions. They will continue their academic studies, connect with peers from a local high school, and explore the language, history, cuisine and regional produce. Each group will also contribute to a community project, fostering a sense of belonging, service and connection.

Students will also travel to Rome, Siena, Florence, Bologna, Pisa and Assisi, deepening their understanding of our Dominican values and charism, and following in the footsteps of St Catherine of Siena to grasp her relevance in today's world.

In 2023, our first pilot group of Year 9 students experienced a three-week immersion program in Tavarnelle. This year, we have a second pilot group embarking on a similar journey. In 2025, Year 9 students will have the opportunity to be part of an expanded, final pilot program. "The trip was one of the greatest experiences I've had in my life. This exciting program will allow students to embrace every opportunity – to do more – ensuring that they are empowered to explore, learn and grow; to ultimately be equipped with knowledge, confidence and compassion to be more in their future.

Year 11 students who attended the Italy Language and Culture Trip in April share their thoughts: "La dolce vita means the sweet life, and life in Italy was indeed very sweet. Our journey began in Venice, where we saw famous monuments such as St Mark's Square and the Doge's Palace. We visited Murano and Burano, witnessed the famous glass blowing and bought lots of charming Murano glass souvenirs. Despite the persistent rain, our Venice experience was a great first taste of Italy.

We then ventured into Verona, explored Juliet's house and sent love letters. The journey continued to Florence where we attended an Italian international school for five days. This allowed us to fully immerse ourselves in the Italian language and culture, practising and applying our conversation skills throughout the trip. Our highlight in Florence was not only exploring the famous Michelangelo artworks, but also enjoying simple moments like making paninis in our hotel room together. We then took a day trip to Pisa, where we 'held up' the Leaning Tower with our hands. We also visited Siena where we learned about St Catherine's upbringing and visited Piazza del Campo. Our final destination – Roma! A memorable moment occurred when we made three wishes at the Trevi Fountain. It was bellissima! We also journeyed into the Vatican City, hoping to catch a glimpse of the Pope, but instead marveled at the renowned Sistine Chapel and its extravagant beauty. The historical architecture was truly inspiring. Additionally, we embarked on a private tour of the Colosseum, discovering that it was once adorned with white marble which was later transported to Pisa.





Sr Margaret Mary Brown OP **Celebrates Seventy Years** of Devotion

We recently had the privilege of meeting with Sr Margaret Mary Brown OP, who served as Principal of Siena College from 1992 to 1994.

Our conversation with Sr Margaret Mary was filled with many captivating stories - so many, in fact, that some will need to be saved for a future article. For now, we hope this gives you a glimpse into the life of this remarkable woman and her deep connection with our school. Sr Margaret Mary entered the Convent in 1952. After completing her religious and professional training, she taught for three years in Strathfield, New South Wales. She then earned her Bachelors Degree at Australian National University and a Diploma of Education in Tasmania, where she also founded Holy Name College. She returned to Canberra as Principal of the newly relocated Signadou Teachers' College, which she led for the next fourteen years.

Seeking new challenges, Sr Margaret Mary applied to go to South America but the Provincial felt she would be more beneficial in Melbourne. In 1977, Sr Margaret Mary was appointed Deputy Principal at Siena College. That same year, she was elected to the Dominican Leadership Team and moved back to Sydney. In 1991, she was once again 'tapped on the shoulder' and appointed Principal of Siena College between 1992 to 1994. Her mandate was to prepare for the appointment of a lay Principal and to establish a School Board. Her term was extended to three years to allow her to complete these tasks.

During our interview, Sr Margaret Mary praised Deputy Principal, Greg Clarke during her tenure, saying, "Anything that was achieved in 1992 to 1994 was thanks to Greg Clarke... I could not have done it without him." Greg was an exceptional leader who knew nearly every student by name and was instrumental in supporting Sr Margaret Mary in expanding the College and promoting it through The Spirit newsletter. He ensured that staff, students and parents had a voice in the development of the College and its Mission Statement. Sr Margaret Mary's creativity shone during the launch of the Mission Statement at the 1994 Commencement Assembly. She 'planted' students in the audience to ask questions about the Mission Statement, ensuring engagement and clarity.

Sr Margaret Mary and Greg Clarke also recruited members for the newly formed Board of Directors, including past and present parents, alumnae, Principals of other schools, and others with Dominican connections. Their photo (pictured right) appeared in the April 1993 issue of The Spirit.

Sr Margaret Mary set a new direction for Siena College, enabling it to grow and mature while maintaining its original 'spirit, tradition and purpose'. While working fulltime, Sr Margaret Mary also completed her Master of Arts and Bachelor of Theology (BTheol). She was also awarded an Honorary Doctorate for her foundational work at Signadou Teachers' College, now a campus of the Australian Catholic University.

Sr Margaret Mary still resides close to the school and was invited to speak at this year's VCE Acknowledgement Assembly. She shared two pieces of advice, using stories to illustrate that everyone is "allowed to do something silly at least once in your life" and that each person's individuality is where their dignity lies. Sr Margaret Mary exemplifies this wisdom, having lived a rich and varied life. We are fortunate at Siena College to have her as part of our community.
