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

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From the Principal



Our Mission as Dominicans and Christians invites us to view the world in a radically different way, to understand the call of the Gospel and that all are made in the image and likeness of God. At the end of Term 1, twelve students and three staff headed off to Kopanang in South Africa to be immersed in a culture and spirituality vastly different from our Australian context. It was an invitation to enter the context of the poor, the disadvantaged and the marginalized, and to engage with the people and the community they encountered. We are so grateful to Dominican Sister, Sheila Flynn for this opportunity to be transformed and to gain new understanding of the social teaching of the Church. Sr Sheila talks of this immersion experience as '... a pilgrimage, a sacred journey into the unknown but in the Spirit's power, that enlarges and engages the heart in transformation.'

This term, we farewell Kate Gotlib after twenty-four years at Siena College. For six of those years, Kate was a student and for the remaining eighteen years, a teacher. Over those years, Kate made an outstanding contribution to so many aspects of life at Siena College. Kate is not only an accomplished educator and teacher of VCE Psychology, she has been a House Coordinator, the Head of Student Formation and Justice Education and taken on many informal roles as health and fitness instructor, cross country runner, debater, writer, and champion of the rights of women to equality. Sue Thompson taught Kate and her reflections are included in this edition of *The Spirit*. Kate will continue in the role of Co President of the Alumnae Association. We wish her well as she moves to St Michael's Grammar School, an independent, coeducational school located in St Kilda, where she will teach Psychology and Research Skills.

Director of Marketing and Communications, Sue Law, has relocated to Tasmania. Sue leaves a significant legacy in the branding and marketing of Siena College, from cinema ads to the alumnae profiles in the local newspapers, the new student uniform that was launched in 2014, the design of the Strategic Plan, many editions of the Yearbook and most recently, the new wayfinding signage, to name just a few. Sue's creativity and her eye for composition were at the heart of some of the beautiful photographs of the College and our community over her time here. Kate and Sue's daily presence will be greatly missed.

The Davenport family are featured in Siena's 75th anniversary publication as notable alumnae. Mr John Davenport celebrated his 97th birthday in April this year and I was privileged to share a conversation with him over lunch as he reminisced about his life and his family, his relationship with the Dominican nuns in the early years in Compton Street where he is still a resident, and his pride and joy in his family and grandchildren. Introducing Jen Levett

Our new Deputy Principal Mission and Identity

As a passionate member of the Collingwood football club, Siena College's new Deputy Principal Mission and Identity, Jen Levett already has black and white in her DNA. Having commenced at the start of the year, Jen says she feels incredibly at home already, due in large part to the welcome she has received from all in our community and also having worked with Anne Muirhead, her predecessor, for six years when they were both at Star of the Sea College.

Jen's childhood was spent on the Mornington Peninsula after her parents decided they wanted to move away from the inner suburbs and settle in Seaford to raise their family. She and her two brothers grew up surrounded by the support of the local Seaford parish, and enjoyed frequent visits to her grandparents' home in Highett. She attended Seaford Primary for her first year of school as the local Catholic school, St Anne's, didn't have a prep class. She switched to St Anne's in Grade 1 and then commenced at Stella Maris College (now John Paul College) in Frankston for her secondary education. Her parents greatly valued education and would 'go without to make sure we had our Catholic education.'

Laughing, Jen recalls her Year 11 Physics teacher at Stella Maris sitting her down and gently suggesting that she was better suited to humanities subjects than the maths/science stream she had chosen. Her dreams of being a pharmacist dashed, she decided on journalism but missed out on a highly sought after place at RMIT and tried for cadetships at *The Age* and *The Herald*, with no success. Undeterred, she accepted an offer to study secondary teaching at Rusden State College (now part of Deakin University) and realised straight away that she had found her calling. 'Once I got there I knew it was what I wanted to do. I had the most amazing lecturers and teachers who just brought the texts to life.' Many VFL players were also completing their teaching degrees, with Mil Hanna and Gerard Healy amongst her classmates.

Celebrating thirty years of teaching in 2018, Jen vividly remembers the phone call from the Education Department with an offer of her first teaching role in Kerang. In a whirlwind of only a few weeks, she and Tony were married and packed up their life in Melbourne to move 400 kilometres away. They spent a very happy eight years in Kerang, immersing themselves in the local community and welcoming their first child, daughter Lucy. In 1996, Jen's husband Tony was offered a role as Deputy Principal at St John Vianney in Parkdale East so they moved back to Melbourne with Jen taking what was initally a relief role at Kilbreda College in Mentone. She looks back on this time in her career with great fondness, appreciative of the mentoring from more experienced teachers who were incredibly giving of their time and knowledge. During her fifteen years at Kilbreda she completed her Masters in Religious Education and in a twist of fate first met Anne Muirhead at a workshop for faith leaders in schools. In 2011, she joined the Religion and Faith team at Star of the Sea, taking on a role as Religious Education Leader.

Jen is teaching Religious Education as she has for the last twenty years, and loves the exploration and the questions, very much in the Dominican tradition of truth seeking. She enjoys the connection with the students on different levels and the way that Religious Education connects with so many other parts of the curriculum. 'I think at Siena there's definitely a feel that the Gospel is real for people, it's not just stories about a man who lived thousands of years ago.'



She sees Siena's great strengths as the commitment of people to the charism, and praises the unwavering sense of justice and fairness and the careful consideration given to how any decision will affect the students first and foremost. She comments, 'I recently told my Year 12 Catholic Studies class, "You will never be as accepted for who you are as you are here, so make the most of it."'

As noted, Jen attends as many Collingwood home games as possible and has wonderful memories of going to the football at Victoria Park with her father. She loves listening to all types of music and cherishes family time at home with daughters Lucy (also a teacher) and Sophie who is completing Year 12. She enjoys travelling and is very much looking forward to the upcoming Dominican Pilgrimage, particularly as she has a strong interest in the liberation theology that underpins our ethos.

We are delighted to welcome Jen to the Siena College community.

Development at Siena College

Siena College is committed to pursuing innovation and opportunities to further enhance learning outcomes for the young women in our care.

As we look back at the development of Siena College, we are reminded of the Dominican Sisters who came to Siena Convent, then a small cottage type dwelling, in August 1926. It was not until 1939 that the new Convent school building was officially opened. In the late 1940s, cottages along the Riversdale frontage were procured as additions to the school, and so began the humble beginnings of Siena.

In 1988, the trustees of the College, the Dominican Sisters, made important and far reaching decisions for the future of the College. They commissioned Philip Roff and Associates to develop a masterplan with the aim to maintain the highest educational standards.

In 2018, it is no different, we continue to plan for our future by improving our facilities. Funds raised from the Butterfly Campaign in 2016 have provided for further building works, including the recent refurbishment of the West Wing Performing Arts Building and Undercroft. Later this year we commence with Pillar IV, transforming the Convent into the gateway of the College. This will become the future home of our Principal, Deputy Principal Mission and Identity, and Reception. A Heritage space and additional meeting rooms will also be housed in the refurbished area.

We know that fees alone cannot fund development of new facilities, grounds and ICT infrastructure in this ever changing educational landscape. With the reduction of government funding in recent times it is even more critical to ensure we are providing for the future. We need to be looking at non traditional forms of raising income such as partnerships and hire of our facilities outside of school hours.

The College is currently working on a new strategic plan and masterplan that will chart the evolution of the College facilities and infrastructure for the next decade. Other proposed initiatives include further philanthropic opportunities, sponsorship and scholarships.

Learning and Teaching



Action Research

In 2018, we are embarking on an exciting learning and teaching initiative. Our professional learning program has been designed to be relevant, collaborative and future focused. As a result, all teaching staff will work in Action Research Teams to investigate, develop and implement key strategies and effective pedagogy to continue providing successful learning outcomes for all Siena students.

Action Research is a disciplined process of inquiry conducted by and for those taking the action. Teachers who engage in Action Research inevitably find it to be an empowering experience. Action Research helps educators be more effective at what they care most about, their teaching and the development of their students. When our teachers have convincing evidence that their work has made a real difference in their students' lives, both our staff and our students reap the benefits.

Based on the research of Robert Marzano and John Hattie, High Impact Teaching Strategies (HITS) were designed to support educators to increase collaborative and evidence based conversations in schools. The HITS are the top ten instructional practices considered to have the most impact on student engagement, achievement and wellbeing. Siena teaching staff have nominated to investigate one of the HITS, as part of an Action Research Team. Our Action Research Teams will focus on exploring how we apply these HITS to our pedagogical practice at Siena College and we will draw on educational research and our student data to determine the effectiveness of each HITS in the classroom, to inform our future practice.

Siena College Learning Framework

In 2017, Michelle Robertson, Director of Learning and Innovation, led staff to develop a shared understanding of learning and create a working framework that would underpin our learning and teaching endeavours at Siena College.

The staff ratified this Learning Framework at the end of last year. It combines our shared understanding of the key components of a successful learning model with our own context at Siena College. In Term 1, our focus has been on embedding the 'Learning Environment' quadrant into our classes.

Learning Environment

The learning environment of a Siena classroom is safe, inclusive, positive, collaborative and challenging. This is supported by clear expectations and consistent routines. Students and teachers feel known and respected. Each student feels empowered to participate, confident to ask questions, express opinions and extend their learning.

Learning Skills


In the Siena classroom, students use questions that go beyond surface level understanding to advance their application of learning. The skill of critical and creative thinking provides the learning opportunity to build willingness in our students to take risks, learn from failure and solve problems collaboratively. Students engage in routines to reflect independently on their learning in order to make connections to prior learning and to clarify the direction of future learning.


Learning Relationships

In our Siena classroom, learning relationships are built upon unconditional positive regard of each individual in the classroom. Our interactions are inclusive, trusting and foster mutual respect. Individual abilities and interests are valued, each voice is shared and supported and students and teachers work together to maximize student engagement, achievement and success.

Learning Behaviours

At Siena College, engaged students are involved, interested and motivated to learn. Collaborative students show a willingness to share and respond. They value student voice, actively participating and listening, thus creating an understanding of learning as a shared purpose and responsibility. A student's attitude to learning is one of growth, having the confidence to take risks and the resilience to respond to challenges and opportunities. Siena students are encouraged to develop emotional self regulation.









Learning and Teaching

Year 10 STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics)

During Activities Week, our Head of Science, Assimina Semertiis, Head of The Arts and Technology, Claire Al-Noah, and Head of Mathematics, Paul Failla, collaborated to provide a day of STEAM opportunities for our Year 10 students. Our Head of Careers, Clare Timmins, also contributed to the program.

In the first STEAM workshop, Through the Looking Glass, students interpreted images of contemporary issues in society using critical thinking and problem solving strategies. In groups, they formed a series of inquiry questions to address through an artistic collage. The collages were then added to the 'Through the Looking Glass' tree. Students worked well throughout the session and were very creative in their approach to the task, developing wide and varied interpretations of the imagery provided.

During the hands on STEAM for Humanity workshop, students were immersed in designing a public facility with the aim of making it accessible to all members of our community.

Before designing their buildings, students participated in empathy building activities and learnt that 20% of our world's population possess an impairment that places restrictions on their lives. Students then completed a number of everyday, practical activities using mobility equipment such as wheel chairs, pickup frames, walking sticks, support canes and crutches. They described how difficult it was to complete everyday tasks when relying upon mobility equipment and how frustrating these restrictions were. With this in mind, they worked collaboratively using the unique Enable Kits to design and build a model of an inclusive facility.

We were well supported by Georgene Bridgeman and Adam Oldmeadow from Akorn Educational Services who led this workshop and assisted our students to acquire new STEAM skills.

The Engineers without Borders (EWB)

school outreach program worked with our Year 10s, focusing on the challenges facing developing countries. The EWB volunteers assisted our

students with investigating how to code disaster warning systems in developing countries.

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During Beyond Siena's Walls,

Year 10 students participated in a comprehensive Academic and Careers testing program. The purpose of this was to track students' progress and identify any students that may require further assistance and intervention in the senior years ahead. The Careers component of the testing provided data that will inform conversations regarding future career options and subject selection for VCE.

Following the testing, Year 10 students enjoyed the stories and thought provoking activities in Shape your Destiny, a program delivered by Successful Integrated. Students were encouraged to consider their passions, talents and strengths when thinking about future careers.

As part of the Year 7 Religious Education program, our students had the pleasure of speaking with some special community members: John Davenport, Sr Frances Caine OP AM, Loyis Gibson, Gayle Peggie, Liz Merrett and Kate Gotlib.

Mr Davenport has been a major part of the Siena community for many years. Mr Davenport's daughters, Margaret and Anne, attended Siena and his wife Eileen taught at the College. The Davenport family resided behind the College and played an important role in supporting the Dominican Sisters. Mr Davenport still lives in the family home and it is always a delight to catch up with him and listen to his stories about living next door to the Sisters. A very strong link and mutual respect developed over the years and still remains between the Davenport family and the Dominican Sisters.

Sr Frances Caine OP AM and Loyis Gibson, née Olive, were classmates from the Class of 1944. Sr Frances and Loyis spoke about their precious memories of school life in the 1940s, the subjects they were taught by the nuns, and the unique bond between the Sisters and students.

Sr Frances Caine OP AM

Sr Frances Caine OP AM (Class of 1944) came from St Dominic's Primary School to Siena at the start of Year 8. There were only thirty-two students at Siena at that time and Frances enjoyed being part of a friendly community.

After completing her education at Siena, Frances entered the Dominican Order in Maitland and from 1948 to1989, she devoted her life to teaching hearing impaired children. In retirement, Sr Frances lived in Aboriginal Bathurst Island communities in the Northern Territory and set up programs for ear health and education.

Sr Frances received an Order of Australia Medal in 2002 for service to children with impaired hearing.





Loyis Gibson

Loyis Gibson, née Olive (Class of 1944) was the seventeenth student enrolled at Siena Convent School in February 1941. She also attended St Dominic's Primary School until Year 8.

Loyis maintained close links to the College through all her friendships, made stronger by her three sisters and their friends who also attended Siena throughout the 1940s, 1950s and early 1960s. The Olive sisters helped to establish the first Past Students' Association. Loyis was awarded a Siena College Community Award at the Academic Awards Evening held in December 2017.

Both Sr Frances and Loyis provide a wealth of knowledge about people, places and the ordinary day to day details of life in our Siena College. We feel blessed that they are still very active members of our community.



Dr Clare Fedele

Dr Clare Fedele (Class of 1999) completed a Bachelor of Biomedical Science (with Honours) in 2003 and then a PhD in cancer biology at Monash University in 2010, supported by the Cancer Council Victoria. During her PhD she became focused on translating laboratory results into improved treatments for people with cancer.

Since 2011, Clare has worked as a post doctoral research scientist at the Peter MacCallum Cancer Institute, focusing on the human skin cancer, melanoma. Her work involves laboratory research, teaching and supervision of students, reporting her findings through publication of articles, and presenting both nationally and internationally. Clare is a Fellow of the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) and previously of the Victorian Cancer Agency (VCA).

What excitement there was on Monday, 26 March as our 2018 Year 9 students hit the streets of Melbourne as part of their Siena in the Interconnected City (SITC) program. The culmination of a term's preparation in Year 9 Geography, SITC 2018 gave our students the opportunity to conduct fieldwork in one of the most exciting places in Victoria, the City of Melbourne.

Using the CBD as their base, the students sought information on inquiry questions they had formulated within one of these key Geography of Interconnections concepts:

Marvellous Melbourne: How do places change over time?

Melbourne, the Place to Be: How does tourism shape our city?

Buy, Swap, Sell: How does commerce and trade shape our city?

Melbourne on the Move: How do we transport goods and people around our city?

Sustainability: From 'Smellbourne' to the 'World's Most Liveable City'.

As part of their investigations, our students took part in an array of city experiences: from rock climbing, visiting the Parliament of Victoria during a very rowdy question time, to visiting an underground cheese room as part of the Taste of Melbourne Gourmet Tour and sitting in the press room at Etihad Stadium. One highlight for many students was their participation in the Fare Share Kitchen program, where they helped produce over 1800 meals for vulnerable Victorians in less than three hours! Using surplus produce from Melbourne's restaurants, the students gained practical experience in dealing with the problems of food waste and lack of access to a nutritious diet for many people. Our Year 9s did a terrific job navigating the streets of Melbourne by planning effectively, met tight timelines and managed unexpected challenges by working in teams.

Being part of a family means having a shared story and earlier this term we welcomed Year 7s into the Siena family by sharing our story with them. As part of the Church and Community unit in Religious Education, the College Archivists introduced the students to the Siena story, using photographs and memorabilia from our archival collection.

Sitting in Caleruega, once the Convent dormitory, we shared a little of the life of the Sisters as recorded in their diary kept from 1926. Photographs were used to show how the school has grown in numbers and how the physical environment has changed dramatically over the years. The original Register introduced us to of some of Siena's first

students, whom the girls would meet in person the following week.

Uniforms through the ages were on show and girls were invited to try on the green 'pinny', which was regulation wear in years gone by. Traditional Dominican classroom discipline techniques were demonstrated using the clacker, and a Year 7 report from 1951 was used to discuss how subjects and assessment methods have changed.

At the end of the presentation, the students visited the Prioress' Cell and the Heritage Gallery and as they left, each girl rang the Tarna bell which was once used to signal the change of lessons.




