800th Anniversary of St Dominic

This year, Dominicans around the world are celebrating St Dominic, in the 800th anniversary of his death. The theme of the jubilee celebration is At Table with St Dominic, inspired by the Mascarella Table, the table on which the first portrait of St Dominic was painted shortly after his canonization. We celebrate Dominic not as a saint alone on a pedestal, but a saint enjoying table fellowship with his brothers, gathered by the same vocation to preach God's Word and sharing God's gift of food and drink.

The Dominican Sisters in Eastern Australia are preparing for their ninth General Chapter later this year. General Chapters are held every four years and a sacred time for the Sisters to review our lives, set directions for the future and elect the Congregation Leadership Team for the next four years. The Sisters have adopted the jubilee theme for the Chapter and will reflect upon the question: 'How does Dominic's life and work inspire and encourage us to share our life, our faith, hope and love, our spiritual and material goods so that others too may be nourished at this same table?'

Year 7 Pillars Leadership Program

During Term 1, the Pillars Leadership Program was made available to all Year 7 students interested in learning more about leadership, as well as those who would like to become leaders at Siena. Designed and facilitated by Claire Moody, Head of Student Formation, the name of the program stems from the four pillars of Dominican life -Prayer/Contemplation, Study, Community and Service/Justice - and explores how these can influence our leadership.

Year 7 Pillars ran across several weeks and provided students with opportunities to examine values, characteristics and skills, as well as meeting current student leaders for insight into their roles; a number of staff also assisted with the sessions, answering questions and encouraging dialogue. Congratulations to all students who participated in this program!



Year 12 Retreat

Holy Week was an ideal time for our Year 12 students to travel to Pallotti College in Millgrove to participate in their annual Retreat. The weather was perfect for all outdoor sessions, including a collaborative art activity and night walk; a sunny and sacred experience of Dadirri (deep listening) was a wonderful way to illustrate the cohesion of the group whilst acknowledging that we are visitors on this land and are therefore called to stewardship of all creation. Students were introduced to the act of writing palancas short affirmations historically gifted to those going on retreat or pilgrimage. Across the days they wrote these to each other, emphasising encouragement and hope.

When students gathered as a cohort to reflect on this year's College theme, Be Possibility, and to view this through their unique Year 12 lens they were open to the opportunities provided by our Christian Dominican tradition at Siena; in small groups with members of the staff Retreat Team they valued the time to initiate further discussion, journal about their wonderings and work on an individual 'Frame of Faith' as a visual reminder of their Retreat experience.

On our final evening, Holy Thursday, we celebrated Eucharist in community and gave thanks for our faith, our families and our education. The following morning students received, read and reflected on their collected palancas before returning to Siena and beginning their holiday break.

Learning and Teaching

Navigating an Educational Pathway through Challenging Times

As a Dominican school we aim 'to engage our students in a challenging education that empowers them with the personal resources to make a difference in the world, by searching for truth through a culture of lifelong learning'. So far, this year has provided much opportunity for student and staff engagement in challenging learning environments. Building upon the skills developed last year, Siena staff and students demonstrated great flexibility and resilience in quickly adjusting to a snap online learning environment a few weeks into the school year! Whilst pleasing to see such a smooth transition, there is no replacement for the buzz in the classroom as students enthusiastically interact with each other in their learning activities, evident as we returned to onsite classes.

Having successfully navigated 2020, we have taken bold steps to integrate online platforms into our daily interactions. Responding to community feedback, MS Teams has again been successfully used to enable ease of access and involvement of more family members in the Parent Teacher Conversations at the end of Term 1. Teams has also been incorporated into classroom learning activities, providing opportunities for online group collaboration, preparing our students for work practices beyond their time at Siena.

At Siena we strive to equip our students to make well-informed choices that expand their opportunities beyond school, challenging them to critically evaluate and appreciate themselves, others and the world around them. The learning opportunities available during our 'See the Possibilities' Activities Week, provided such stimuli, taking our term's classroom learning and applying it to real world situations.

Under the guidance of Claire Al-Noah, Head of the Arts and Technology, Jemimah Walsh, Director of Learning and Innovation, and the Year 9 elective teachers, our Year 9s participated in a city experience that gave students opportunity to explore, question and suggest areas of change when faced with inequality, embracing all possibilities offered through study of The Arts and Technology in the real-world setting. This required students to navigate the city, including Melbourne's public transport, prioritise, problem solve and negotiate the program as a team, engage with our wider community,

appreciate the aesthetic beauty of Melbourne and build self-efficacy in their personal capacity. The benefits of the experience are evident in the photos below and on the next page.

Navigating the educational pathway requires identification of strengths and interests and taking time for reflection on potentialities. Throughout our 'See the Possibilities' Activities Week, our Year 10 and 11 students participated in a program created by Anita Galli, Head of Senior Pathways, Clare Timmins, Head of Careers and Liz Merrett, Alumnae Coordinator, that enabled engagement with skill building and contemplation of post school pathways through dialogue with Siena alumnae. Students heard from guest presenters discussing careers and opportunities in business, medicine, education, environment and sustainability, in order to broaden their understanding of how they too as Siena women, can positively act for the common good.

Elevate Education delivered year level specific study skills that encouraged use of mnemonics, effective study routines and actionable goal setting. It was wonderful to have Cinzia Pellicciotta (Class of 2017) as one of the presenters, to share her learning experience with the students. Building upon this session, students delved deeper into understanding their career profile through the Morrisby Profiling Quiz. Results will provide useful guidance as students consider subject choices and look for pathways beyond Siena.


Navigating the educational pathway is definitely a journey and this week our students travelled along a little further, self reflecting, gathering information and taking steps toward their post school destinations.

The Wellness Program

The Wellness Program is integrated into the timetable at Siena and occurs each week on a Tuesday morning, following House Group. Students are offered the opportunity to engage in activities that actively promote wellbeing practices, enabling them to develop strategies to cope with the challenges of life and have confidence to take charge of their own mental health and self-care. Students also engage in discussions and activities about

important events and issues of justice, as this enables them to consider their connection to the community in which they live. We regularly seek feedback and ideas from students via the Student Representative Council (SRC) as the Wellness Program aims to

(SRC) as the Wellness Program aims to incorporate student voice and reflect what student believe is important to their own wellbeing. The program varies each term and aims to be responsive to and meet the needs of the students whilst growing their resilience and social and emotional skills.

In 2021, following the events of last year, the theme and focus of this year's

Wellness Program is 'Reconnection'. This involves providing students with opportunities to establish and reinforce connections with their peers, including those in their House Group, year level and House. Many of the Wellness sessions are facilitated by House Group teachers, and there are also presentations from other staff, such as Heads of House and the College Counsellors.



Interview with Ms Laughlin

An Interview with our Deputy Principal Learning and Teaching by College Captains, Chloe Barker and Harriette La Motte.

WHEN AND WHERE DID YOUR CAREER IN EDUCATION BEGIN?

I began teaching at Salesian College, Chadstone twenty-six years ago.

WHAT DO YOU FIND THE MOST REWARDING PART OF YOUR CAREER?

Working with students to help them develop their self belief and realise their full potential. More recently, working directly with staff to grow their capacity and also realise their potential to best serve our students.

My priority is to ensure that I am always providing the best learning environment for both students and staff. I love researching new aspects of the subjects I teach or undertaking study in leadership. Whilst I don't 'love' the correction, I do love the reward of seeing students grow in their confidence and writing ability throughout the year. I am inspired by those who use their position to make things better for others and who continue to be open to learning. I look for role models who see value in 'team'. WHAT ASPECT OF SIENA DO YOU LOVE THE MOST?

This one is easy – the sense of community. I love the fact that I can easily get to know all students, in the corridors, in the yard and in class, and our communal staff area totally encourages a community/team approach amongst staff.

WHAT DID YOU ENJOY MOST ABOUT YOUR SECONDARY SCHOOLING EXPERIENCE?

Learning – I was one of those who loved going to school every day! I loved being in class and learning in English, History and Legal Studies.

Our ASPIRE Program invites local primary students to work with Year 8 Siena student mentors on STEAM based activities. STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Mathematics) education is an integrated curriculum designed to equip students with knowledge in these five disciplines whilst gaining valuable collaborative and analytical skills.

In 2021, our ASPIRE participants are exploring colour principles of both pigment and light, artistic symbolism and sustainability. We were excited to have St Bridget's Primary students visit during

the last week of Term 1, working with our Year 8s to explore what "home" means to each of them. They created model houses which were combined together as an installation to form a community, watched the 3D printer in action, and presented their findings about colour via a livestream to their parents. Principal, Elizabeth Hanney awarded all of our visitors with a certificate of participation and commended them on their terrific enthusiasm over the two day program.






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Alumnae Wall Inscriptions for 2020/21

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From the archives

Caring for our Heritage Collection

The term 'archives' often suggests dusty boxes piled haphazardly in cellars and attics. Whilst this vision does hold true in some instances, many archives, particularly those operated by major institutions, are sophisticated environments designed to serve the specific preservation requirements of their collection. When it comes to our personal and family history archives however, many of us are guilty of stashing items at the back of a cupboard with the intention of 'sorting through them later'.

Leaving aside catastrophes such as fire and flood, the great enemies of preserving any collection are heat, light, damp and pests. At Siena we are lucky to have our archives located in a clean, dry and secure environment but caring for our collection does not end there. Every donation is carefully assessed on arrival; any necessary cleaning or conservation is performed before the item is scanned or photographed. Physical items are wrapped in an appropriate material and then stored in acid-free boxes whilst photographs are annotated and referenced and then placed in archival photograph folders and stored in the compactus.

Caring for the physical needs of the collection is only part of the process. In many ways it is more important to discover the story or provenance of individual items. When we accession an item we try to find out as much information as possible: when was this uniform worn? By whom? What are the names of the girls in the photograph? When and where was it taken and what was the occasion? The more we know about a donation, the more valuable that item is within our collection. A photograph of students wearing Siena College uniform is just an image, but the same photograph with a date and names can be used to make connections and tell the Siena story.

The information we gather about items in our collection is entered into our database and archival management system. This allows us to retrieve items with ease for research, publications, use at reunions, and displays around the College. The technology also allows us to search for links between donors and items and the more information we can enter, the more connections we can make.

No matter how small the collection, it can benefit from some of the approaches and techniques mentioned above. As an archivist, if I could give only one piece of advice it would be to label your photographs on the back with a soft (6B) pencil: names, date, location, event, whatever you can remember. Your descendants and the family historian will thank you.
